His Majesty the Sultan fulfills Islam's fifth pillar

Thousands of Bruneians thronged the Brunei International airport last month to welcome His Majesty the Sultan on his return from Mecca after performing the haj Islam's fifth pillar.

His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam arrived on August 8, 1987 to a red carpet welcome from members of the royal household, state digniteries, diplomats and senior government officials.


Outside the airport thousands of his subjects from a cross-section of the population milled to see and greet their ruler on his safe return

Roads from the airport to Nurul Iman Palace were sealed off as flag waving school children lined the 16 kilometre-route.

His Majesty who is the Head of the Islamic faith in the Sultanate left the country on July 18, 1987 accompanied by his brother His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Digadong Sahibul Mal Pengiran Muda Haji Jefri Bolkiah, the Finance Minister, Pehin Orang Kaya Laila Setia Bakti Diraja Dato Laila Utama Haji Awang Isa, the Special Adviser to His Majesty cum the Home Affairs Minister, Pehin Orang Kaya Ratna Diraja Dato Seri Utama Dr Ustaz Haji Awang Mohd. Zain the Religious Affairs Minister and Pengiran Sanggamara Diraja Major General Pengiran Haji Ibnu, the Deputy Defence Minister.

While in Saudi Arabia His Majesty the Sultan was received by His Majesty King Fahd.

Over three thousand muslims from the Sultanate performed the *haj* in Mecca this year.

Keep those farms growing

The agrarian roots of many societies are often leached out by the solicitous embrace of high-tech modernisation. The end result is often a sterile string of achievements and a sense of history which has not been lost but actually killed off by the mists of time.

The mixed blessing of rapid modernisation has not befallen our agricultural sector yet and the call of the Development Minister for more Bruneians to take up farming is deserving of serious consideration.

Among the myths that have to be swept out of the way are that farming is for the cerebrally less endowed or the last resort for the unemployed. The scriptures tell us that agricultural work is an expression of our total dependence on God's providence for each day that we live; the work that brings us closest to God-consciousness and God knows we could do that more of that.

It is of extreme strategic importance that local farmers really start digging the message as only some 30 percent of national food needs is domestically produced. The government has the resources like the expertise to advise farmers, subsidy schemes and lands has been pledged for the purpose.

Associated with farming are several traditions that have been practised in the Sultanate for centuries and there is concern that these might disappear with the shrinking numbers of land areas devoted to farming. Try celebrating a harvest when the last real harvest of anything was well beyond the memory of the celebrants. The symbols are important as chroniclers of who we are and whence we goeth.

With the farming sector contributing a miniscule one percent to the gross national product the dream of diversifying the economic base away from the petroleum industry seems a while away as yet.

Air pact inked

An air services agreement has been signed between Brunei Darussalam and the Philippines.

The pact signed on August 24, 1987 in Bandar Seri Begawan gives an airline from each country twice weekly landing rights in the other country using Boeing 737 or BAC 111 aircraft.

The Sultanate has signed similar agreements with Singapore, Malaysia, Thailand, Maldives and Nepal.

Youth Minister visits Fed. Rep. of Germany

Manila, BSB can cooperate for stability

His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Perdana Wazir Sahibul Himmah Wal-Waqar Pengiran Muda Haji Mohamed Bolkiah, the Foreign Affairs Minister has expressed the confidence that Brunei Darussalam and the Philippines could cooperate for regional peace and political stability.

His Royal Highness was speaking at a dinner he hosted for his Excellency Mr Salvador H. Laurel. the Philippines Vice-President during a one day visit to Bandar Seri Begawan on August 24, 1987.

He described regional peace as a prerequisite to economic development. Referring to an air services agreement that had been signed the same day between the two countries the Bruneian Minister said that it would help strengthen the 'existing good ties'.

Mr Laurel, who is also his country's Foreign Affairs Minister said that more avenues of trade and other economic cooperation

Upmarket shops told: sell more local produce

Supermarkets and other more posh retailers have been told to sell more locally produced agricultural products as their contribution to the national effort to boost that sector of the economy.

At present agriculture accounts for some one percent of the gross domestic product and Pengiran Dato Seri Laila Jasa Dr Haji Ismail, the Development Minister has expressed keenness that more Bruneians should take up agriculture as a livelihood.

Speaking at the opening of the annual agricultural show outside Bandar Seri Begawan on August 22, 1987 the minister said that the government was keen to assist would be farmers in any way. This included making land available for commercial scale farming ventures and the skills of officials trained in agricultural disciplines.


The government was also in the process of organising a farming subsidy scheme and a more effective marketing system for agricultural produce and seeking ways of creating new jobs in farming.

With the gradual decline in the amount of farming done in the Sultanate there was also concern that many traditions associated with farming might disappear.

The two-day show included competitions among farmers and commercial agriculturalists for fruit, vegetables ornamental plants and livestock. Suppliers to the farming industry also took the opportunity to display the latest in equipment and technology including the cloning method of propagating fruit trees.

British institutions hold exhibition on education

Several universities and polytechnics' from the United Kingdom were represented in the Sultanate last month in a three day exhibition 'Studying in Britain' organised by the British Council in Bandar Seri Begawan.

Speaking at the opening of the exhibition Pehin Orang Kaya Setia Pahlawan Dato Seri Setia Awang Abd. Rahman, the Education Minister said that government aspirations on education as the country "has special problems when it comes to manpower planning."

"The Education Minstry's current policy," said the Minister, 'is sending students to the United Kingdom to pursue higher education particularly in medicine including dentistry, law, accountancy, engineering and other fields."

On display at the exhibition were leaflets on the various courses offered by the institutions including engineering, agriculture, law, management and business studies leading to diploma, degree and post graduate qualification.

Third session opens at UBD

The University of Brunei Darussalam's third academic session began last month with a new intake of 168 students, 77 of them girls.

This year the university also admitted four students from the ASEAN member countries on Brunei Darussalam government schoolarships. The students are from Thailand, Malaysia and Indonesia.

The university has a student population of over five hundred doing four-year degree programmes leading to bachelor's degrees in arts, science and education.

Courses of study at the university include economics, business studies, Malay Literature, Islamic studies and social policy and planning.

Sultanate at WHO confab on AIDS

Brunei Darussalam was among the 28 countries represented at the WHO-sponsored conference on AIDS, attended by ministers from the Australasia region.

Dato Paduka Dr Haji Johar the Sultanate's Health Minister led a delegation to the meeting which was held in Sydney, Australia last month.

Discussions during the meeting centred on the political, economic, social and legal aspects dealing with AIDS.

After the conference the minister spent a week touring hospitals and other facilities manufacturing drugs and medical equipment in South Australia.

ASEAN Secretary General Bruneian Awang Roderick Yong has said that the association had progressed slowly but steadily.


In a message for the occassion,

Awang Yong said that the grouping had helped in promoting 'mutual trust and understanding among the members and its success internationally has enhanced its prestige and international recognition.'

He also mentioned that the grouping had contributed to regional peace and prosperity.

'ASEAN cooperation efforts and achievements in political, economic, social, cultural information and science and technology areas are in fact significant though they did not always attract headline attention,' he added.

Anniversary mintage for collectors



N umismatists had a chance to add to their collection last month when the Brunei Currency Board issued four commemorative coins to mark its 20th anniversary on August 24, 1987.

The mint coins were in gold proof and silver proof, while the coin set consisted of a one, five, ten, twenty, fifty sen and \$1 were struck in sterling silver proof and two thousand more of the specimen coin sets in cupro-nickel were struck by the Singapore mint, Singapore.

Top in the picture is the \$100 gold proof coin of which one thousand pieces were minted selling at costing \$600 each. Second from top is the \$20 silver proof of which three thousand pieces were produced and sold at \$60 each.

The \$100 gold proof and \$20 silver proof coins have a common obverse showing the portrait of His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam while the Omar Ali Saifuddien Mosque is depicted on the reverse.

Third in the arrangement are the sterling silver coins sold at \$80 per set and the cupro-nickel specimen set priced at \$20 per set. Both sets have the same obverse as the gold proof coins however the reverse carries different designs for each denomination.

UBD hosts international seminar

Stamps mark ASEAN's 20th birthday Collectors have three more stamps to acquire when the Postal Services Department issued a new set of commemoratives on August 8, 1987, to mark the ASEAN's 20th anniversary.

The stamps, in denominations of 20 sen, 50 sen and \$1, were designed by Bruneian artist Awang Zainal Abidin bin Haji Ibrahim and printed by Security Printer (M) Sdn. Bhd. Malaysia.

Overseas collectors can obtain the stamps by writing to the Philatelic Bureau, Post-master General, Brunei Darussalam. Requests for standing order should be accompanied by a minimum deposit of \$30.



Royal Brunei Airlines, which has been operating services between Kuala Lumpur and Bandar Seri Begawan since 1982, formally launched its newly appointed General Sales Agent (GSA) in Peninsula Malaysia last month.

The GSA Blue Moon Travel Sdn Bhd will handle the airlines' passenger and cargo marketing, in Peninsula Malaysia from Kuala Lumpur and special services at Subang International Airport.

Blue Moon Travel staff have undergone training at Royal Brunei's headquarters in the operation of the airline's BIKOM computerised reservations system. They have also been familiarised with Royal Brunei's Boeing 757 and 737 services to Singapore, Kota Kinabalu, Kuching, Hong Kong, Manila, Bangkok, Darwin, Jakarta and Taipei.

A reception was held on August 27, 1987 in Kuala Lumpur for around 300 guests drawn from Peninsula Malaysia's aviation bodies, travel and cargo trade, business community and media. 'Cheese' from riverside trees


The fruit in the picture is the Pedada laut known scientifically as Sonneratia Caseolaris, one of the three varieties in the Sonneratiaceace family.

The pedada laut tree which is usually not cultivated, grows to a height of up to 21 metres on the banks of tidal rivers and mangrove swamps.

The fruits have a variety of uses in cooking and as home health remedies. The young fruits are sour while ripe one have a cheesy taste.

The juice of a half ripe fruit is drunk for coughs while the fruit-wall of an old fruit is given as a vermifuge. The fermented juice can also be used in arresting haemorrhage.

The ripe pedada laut when added to a sauce of shrimp paste make an excellent dip for ambuyat a favourite among bruneians made from sago flour. The dip is also used as a salad dressing.
