Brunei Darussalam And Iran Strengthen Existing Relations

Brunei Darussalam and the Islamic Republic of Iran have further strengthened their existing close and friendly relations in the wake of a state visit by the Iranian President, His Excellency Mr. Akbar Hashemi Rafsanjani to the Sultanate, on 15-17 October. This was in response to the state visit by His Majesty Paduka Seri

Baginda Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam to Iran early this year.

This was stated in a joint statement issued in Bandar' Seri Begawan at the end of the three-day state visit by the Iranian leader, who was leading a more than one hundred member-delegation. The president was accompanied by his wife, Mrs. Efat Hashemi Rafsanjani.

The joint statement said that the two leaders met at Istana Nurul Iman on 15 October 1994, and reaffirmmed the principles and sentiments expressed in their joint statement during His Majesty's visit in February this year. They also exchanged views on a

number of matters of common concern in an atmosphere of cordiality and common understanding which reflected the friendship and goodwill shared by the governments and peoples of both countries.

His Majesty and the visiting Iranian President expressed their satisfaction with the relations deve-

loping between Brunei Darussalam and the Islamic Republic of Iran. In order to enhance this relationship through the promotion of trade and investment, and the establishment of cultural, religious, educational and scientific cooperation, the two leaders approved the signing of a memorandum of understanding for cooperation in these areas and agreed on the establishment of a joint commission, the statement added.

The statement pointed out that the heads of state reiterated their support for the establishment of contact and cooperation between the Economic Cooperation Organisation (ECO) and ASEAN; and expressed their willingness to assist in its realisation.

Both leaders also reviewed issues of concern to the Islamic ummah, including the current situations in Bosnia-Herzegovina, Afghanistan, the Middle East and Central Asia.

Aggression in Bosnia condemned

The statement said that they further condemned the violations of human rights and the continued aggression in Bosnia-Herzegovina, particularly the policy of ethnic cleansing, and expressed profound concern about the injustices suffered by the people of that country.

Both leaders re-expressed their support for the resolution adopted by the Organisation of Islamic Conference (OIC) at its extraordinary session in Islamabad, calling for the lifting of the arms embargo against the Bosnian Muslims.

Further solidarity needed

The two Heads of State stressed on the need for further solidarity and closer cooperation among member states of OIC so that it may undertake initiatives to make greater and more effective use of its available resources in order to increase cooperation among the members.

They also emphasised the many common views and perceptions held by Brunei Darussalam and the Islamic Republic of Iran, and recognised the need for closer cooperation so that both countries can assist in promoting global peace and stability, building respect for international law, and upholding the principles enstrined in the United Nations Charter.

The visit of the Iranian President also strengthened and further promoted the spirit of Islamic solidarity and bilateral cooperation, the joint statement concluded.

Arrival

President Refsanjani, his wife and delegation arrived at the Brunei International Airport on October 15, and were welcomed by His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Perdana Wazir Sahibul Himmah Wal-Waqar Pengiran Muda Mohamed Bolkiah, the Foreign Affairs Minister and his wife, Yang Teramat Mulia Pengiran Anak Isteri Pengiran Anak Hajjah Zariah.

The President accompanied by His Royal Highness, was later driven in a motorcade to Istana Nurul Iman, as thousands of school children lined the route, waving both countries' national flags to greet the

visiting Iranian leader.

Ceremonies at Istana Nurul Iman

At Istana Nurul Iman, His Majesty The Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam welcomed the Iranian President while Mrs. Efat Hashemi Rafsanjani's arrival at a special entrance of Istana Nurul Iman was welcomed by Her Majesty Paduka Seri Baginda Raja Isteri Pengiran Anak Hajjah Saleha and Her Royal Highness Pengiran Isteri Haijah Mariam.

His Majesty and the Iranian President proceeded to the royal dais to receive the salute as both countries' national anthems were played accompanied by a 17-gun salute.

The president later inspected a guard of honour mounted by the Royal Brunei Armed Forces personnel.

His Majesty, the visiting President and members of their families proceeded to Balai Penghadapan for an audience ceremony.

This was followed by a four-eye (one-to-one) meeting in another room of Istana Nurul Iman between the two leaders.

State banquet in honour of Iranian President

In the evening, His Majesty hosted a state banquet at Istana Nurul Iman in honour of President Refsanjani and the male members of his delegation.

Brunei-Iran similar

In his 'titah' (royal address) at the banquet, the

Brunei ruler stated that Brunei Darussalam and the Islamic Republic of Iran are similiar although differ in respective geo-political positions, policies and preoccupations.

The monarch said: "Iran is a large country with a glorious and ancient history. It is sited in one of the world's most strategic regions, the Middle-East which at the present moment is still in a state of turbulence and experiencing great changes."

His Majesty said that comparatively Brunei Darussalam is a small country in Southeast Asia and although it is small in size, it is able to survive with a pleasant history, even after dismemberment of its territories by former colonial powers.

"Our resilience and proud history, owe much to the attitude and efforts of the just and religion abiding Kings of the country," His Majesty pointed out.

"This is our only wealth and uniqueness in facing various challenges and problems of time," the ruler stressed.

His Majesty expressed confidence that although some of the circumstances and experiences which shapen our world views are different, we may in fact through open and honest personal contact more readily understand and accept each other's different standpoints."

This undoubtedly would also lead to mutula respect and at the same time would become a stimulus to an enduring friendship, the monarch said.

Countries need to be pragmatic

His Majesty went on to

say that the upheavals that have followed the end of the Cold War have made it necessary for most countries to be pragmatic in their international relations.

"Ideology no longer forces us to divide the world between either 'friends' or 'adversaries', even though countries are diverse in their needs. All countries need to be practical in seeking peace, stability and economic growth for their peoples."

"In these matters, there is no one with different attitude. So it is with us, and in fact on a number of issues, we also share similar views, for example on Bosnia and other issues which degrade the Islamic Ummah and the Islamic religion," His Majesty stressed.

Differences no obstacles to cooperation

The monarch said that if there are differences, that should not hinder them from working together especially when they share common goals, which could be seen in the context of both countries' membership of the Organisation of Islamic Conference (OIC) and the Non-Aligned Movement (NAM).

Citing his visit to Iran, His Majesty said that he was able to learn at first hand of the progress the Iranian President had made, his current plans and future aims.

"I believe that it is in this respect that we have many similarities, that is to see both our respective peoples achieve high standards of living and prosperity, not only physically but also spiritually."

Iran-Brunei Darussalam relationship move into a new phase

In his reply, the Iranian President highlighted that the relationship between Iran and Brunei Darussalam has moved into a new phase.

President Rafsanjani said that despite the young relations of the two countries, history reveals an acquaintance and frequation of Iranians to South East Asian countries. Even before the arrival of Islam to this region, the Iranian merchants have been travelling bet-ween the Persian Gulf and the South China Sea (the Silk Sea Route) in order to have trade relations with that country and the ASEAN regional countries.

After the arrival of Islam, he added, the message of deliverance of this peaceful religion was conveyed to the South East Asia through Iranian merchants,

One of the obvious points regarding the depth of relations between the two countries is the existence of Persian vocabulary in the 'Melayu' or Malay language. Therefore, with the support of our old and deep relations, we hope to be able to witness the ever-expansion of the relations of the two countries.

The President also suggested cooperation between the two countries in investments, exchange of experiences, scientific, technical and cultural cooperation; and he experssed the hope "to witness the ever consolidation and expansion of this relationship and fruition of mutual cooperation."

Iran's expanding relations

based on its foreign policy

The Iranian President also cited his country's expanding relations with South East Asian countries, which are based on emphasis of the principles of the republic's foreign policy towards multilateral expansion of relations with developing Muslim nations.

"Common views and stance of our countries on the international affairs is another basis of our mutual understanding and action in the international fora, particularly on crucial international issues including Bosnia-Herzegovina, wherein the racial cleansing of Muslims by Serbs still continued with the support of powerful elements."


The president added that the prevailing conditions of today's world would call for inevitable cooperation between the Muslim and developing countries. The president also highlighted that cooperation between ASEAN and the Economic Cooperation Organisation (ECO) is the determining factor in this era of new economic, political and cultural polarization.

Also present at the banquet were His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Duli Pengiran Muda Haji Al-Muhtadee Billah, His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Perdana Wazir Sahibul Himmah Wal-Waqar Pengiran Muda Mohamed Bolkiah and His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Digadong Sahibul Mal Pengiran Muda Haji Jefri Bolkiah.

Meanwhile, a similar banquet was hosted separately for Mrs. Efat Hashemi Rafsanjani and the women


H is Majesty Paduka Seri Baginda Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam has consented to receive the credentials of foreign envoys to Brunei Darussalam. The new diplomats are from the Sultanate of Oman, the Republic of Mali and the European Union. The ceremonies took place at Istana Nurul Iman on October.

The first diplomat to present his credential to His Majesty was the Ambassador of the Sultanate of Oman, His Excellency Mr. Ahmed bin Mohammad bin Masoud Al-Riyami. The 46 year-old envoy is a B.A. graduate in geography from Beirut Arab University. The Omani Ambassador has previously worked for his country's diplomatic missions in Islamabad and Moscow.

The Brunei ruler later consented to receive the credential of the non-resident Ambassador of the Republic of Mali, His Excellency Mr. Mahmood Abdu Zubair. The 53-year old diplomat holds a Master in the Arabian and Islamic Studies, and Ph.D in Islamic Studies (History).

The other non-resident envoy presenting his credential to His Majesty was the High Commissioner of the European Union, His Excellency Mr. Klauspeter Schmallenbach. The 54 year-old envoy joined the services of the Commssion of the European Communities in Brussels in 1969 and has held various positions including in the Directorate-General of External Relations from 1981 to 1993.

After the credential presentations, His Majesty granted separate audiences to the diplomats.





Prophet's Educational System Secures The Faith Of Muslims: State Mufti

Brunei Darussalam's State Mufti has urged Muslims throughout the world to refer or get back to the educational system of Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him), which emphasises on the importance of preserving faith so as to secure the faith of Muslims from being eroded.

Speaking at the official naming ceremony of a new secondary school at the National Housing Scheme in Mentirion October 20, Yang Dimuliakan Pehin Tuan Imam Dato Paduka Seri Setia Ustaz Haji Awang Abdul Aziz bin Juned, the State Mufti, also stressed that today's education no longer emphasises on the question of faith and piety, even in countries where Islam has long been practised.

The State Mufti said that the institution of learning and education of Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) has clearly guided us towards these ends as it is the source for security and endurance of the Islamic ummah.

Attempts to undermine Islam

The State Mufti further stressed that effort to undermine the Islamic religion and its followers began with the destruction of their faith, while citing on the existence of a syndicate to destroy Islam by using drugs. Historically, drugs were used as weapons by the English people to weaken China's army, known as the 'Opium War' while one of the superpower countries

had to retreat in Vietnam because of drugs, he added.

The invasion of the Muslim faith has been organised neatly and secretly through various guises, among others, it takes the form of a modern and distinctive educational system which seemingly guarantees a prosperous economy and extreme pride. The faith of the Islamic ummah, meanwhile, diminishes day by day without their being aware, the State Mufti stressed.

This has terrified us most, he said, while adding that time has come of what Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) said in his 'hadis', which means that "time will come to mankind that no one of the one thousand men or more worshippers in a mosque has faith."

Another hadis says: "It will happen to mankind in an era when no one of those who perform the 'haj', perform the prayer and who fast, has faith."

The State Mufti also emphasised that Muslims are therefore obliged to learn the teachings of "tauhid" (belief in God the Almighty), the Al-Quran, history of Islam including Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) and his followers as well as knowing about the "halal-haram" (permissible and forbidden according to Islamic teachings) related matters.

Integration of Islamic and modern education

Under the leadership of His Majesty's Government, Brunei Darussalam through the implementation of its educational system has been able to secure the faith of Muslims in its own way by integrating the educational system of Prophet Muhammad with modern system, said the State Mufti.

Earlier in his speech, he noted that the naming of the new school by taking the name of the country's late State Mufti, Pehin Datu Seri Maharaja Dato Seri Utama Dr. Awang Haji Ismail, is appropriate due to his service, apart from hoping that education in the country will continue to produce not only educated people but pious ones too.

At the ceremony, the State Mufti was presented a momento, and he planted a tree to mark the occasion and also led other guests to view an exhibition.



Make Available Human Resources That Could Be Developed

The Permanent Secretary in the Prime Minister's Office, Yang Dimuliakan Pehin Udana Khatib Dato Paduka Ustaz Awang Haji Badaruddin recently highlighted the importance of making available human resources that could be developed to handle duties in the field of broadcasting.

The field of broadcasting is not only challenging the creativity and expertise of human resources but it is also expanding rapidly, he stressed.

In a speech before he declared open the Human Resources Development Course in Broadcasting at the Lecture Hall of the Hassanal Bolkiah National Stadium on October 3, the Permanent Secretary said that the experience of the country in the field of broadcasting is still rather limited to the radio and television services run by the Government.

"There are signs that these may be enhanced with television services run by a privately-owned tv transmission", he added.

"However, regardless of the limited experience and no matter what the level of experience in human resources might be, the conceivable issue is the social impact and the widespread influence that broadcasting may have on the country with regard to the programme contents," he said.

"We do not deny that the process of globalisation through the filed broadcasting will not make it possible for a small country like Brunei Darussalam to disengage itself. Even without any intention, spillover broadcasts and transmission from foreign television stations will continue to expose the people of Brunei to foreign values and norms," he added.

The Permanent Secretary pointed out that our general concern now is the contents of those foreign programmes that could jeopardise moral and social values which we have disseminated through formal and informal education.

"It is clear that the existing policy that regulates the installation of the parabola (satellite dish) will not be very effective. And we are not certain whether such control or regulation will be required in the future in the face of rapid development in communication technology which also involves broadcasting," he stressed.

He said appropriate steps should be considered by taking pro-active approaches to deal with such developments in broadcasting.

He believes that Radio Television Brunei (RTB) is already prepared to take appropriate steps in the near future, and appreciates the organisation's ability to compete with foreign stations.

"This is where it is essential for RTB to have quality manpower in order to enable it to extend and increase its present and future service," the Permanent Secretary stressed.

Touching on the importance of human resources development in broadcasting, Yang Dimuliakan Pehinsaid that this has always been given due attention by managers in such field.

They realise that their weaknesses and failure to achieve their objectives and tasks in broadcasting are mainly due to manpower or human recources whose talent could not be developed either because they are not given proper guidance and training or after having been trained, they feel more comfortable to remain at the same, old level and position, he said.

"Such manpower or human resources cannot be hoped to develop and therefore it is essential for broadcasting managers to think of other means or alternatives for them not to become a burden to the organisation and management," the Permanent Secretary stressed.

He further spoke on the tendency of line managers

in broadcasting organisations to increase the number of manpower following an increase in their duties and responsibilities. This has always been under scrutiny by managers at the higher level, he added.

"The outcome is now always in favour of the broadcasting management. Instead, not only are they being asked but in certain cases they are also being urged to be more realistic by taking into account matters such as: the optimal use of available resources; reorganising duties and work that may overlap, or reorganising working priorities; and not least important is that the broadcasting managers will be required to organise additional works and duties as suggested," added the Permanent Secretary.

Such additional duties do not merely mean an increase in the number of the same programme and an increase in transmission hours, but to increase the variety of programmes with the transmission hours being extended, he said.

The course on Human Resources Development in Broadcasting was organised by the Asia Pacific Institute for Broadcasting Development (AIBD). It was proposed by Brunei Darussalam in the 19th AIBD Governing Council Meeting in Tehran, Iran in 1993.

The hosting of the course by RTB shows its maturity in its interactions with re-

Brunei Darussalam Needs Standards In Other Fields Other Than In The Construction Industry

Brunei Darussalam needs to set itself to having standards in other fields, besides the construction industry, in order to protect consumers.

"Developing countries already have standards in foods and drinks, clothings, transportation, telecommunication, security and those which involve all aspects of life. I believe Brunei Darussalam too, should aim towards this in the future" said the Minister of Development.

Officiating at the World Standards Day 1994, the Conference on the Standards and Consumers and the launching of the Standards of Quality Management System - ISO 9000 on 15 October, the Development Minister, Yang Berhormat Pengiran Dato Seri Paduka Dr. Haji Ismail said, the major users of construction materials in the country is the government itself.

We as consumers certainly need assurance in the aspect of safety, stability, resistance and maintainance of walls and roofs, he said. The environment and long-term factor should also be taken into account when considering the development of standards, added the Minister.

The Minister hoped that the sharing of knowledge in the construction field and the dialogue with repre-

sentatives from the Singapore Institute Standards and Research body (SISIR) and Malaysian Ministry of Domestic Trade and Consumer Affairs would be beneficial towards more protection for consumers in the country.

International Standardisation Organisation (ISO), he said, has recently streamlined the Standard Series ISO 9000 Quality Management System, and is now known as 'Piawaian Brunei Darussalam ISO 9000 (PBD ISO 9000)' or 'Brunei Darussalam Standardisation ISO 9000'.

The Standard is similar to the ISO standard without any ammendment of text and is designed not only for the construction industry but also for industries which use the Quality Management System.

The Development Ministry through the Con-

struction, Planning and Research Unit (CPRU), said the Ministers, is responsible in publishing the standards through the Technical Committee (TECO) in fields related to iron, concrete, wood and Quality Management System.

Brunei Darussalam does not have facilities and sufficient skilled manpower to produce a series of complete and comprehensive standardisation, such as in Britain and the neighbouring countries, he noted. He appreciated effort by members of TECO both from the government and private sector for their contribution in providing such standards.

"Nevertheless, in issuing the Brunei Darussalam Standard, the technical committees had observed the best standards used by the world and studies its relevance in the local working methodology and marketing of the country. In this way, we have been able to issue the standard most relevant to our needs," said the Minister.

Having ISO 9000 certificate is a first step in preparing a quality service, and to achieve the stage of better quality, and those engaged in an industry should have knowledge and skill, the Minister stressed.

He further urged employers and workers alike to make good use of the knowledge. It was also important, he said, for companies to provide well-planned training programme so that everyone from the rank of Managing Director to labourers continue making effort towards improving and upgrading their skills and productivity.

The Minister also called on consultants, contractors and suppliers to take appropriate measures to conduct the management of ISO 9000 Quality Management System in their respective organisation.

The World Standard Day is observed on 14 Ocotber every year, with its theme this year 'Piawai dan Pengguna: Rakan Ke Arah Dunia Yang Lebih Sempurna' or 'Standards and Consumer: A Companion Towards A World of Excellence."

It is aimed at reviewing the development of standardisation that has been achieved, while giving emphasis on the planning for the following year. The observation of the World Standards Day was also aimed at seeking a means for a consumer to get more engaged in the development and introduction of standardisation.

The Minister also spoke about one of the main functions of the standards, which is to protect the customers' interests and safety.



School Takes Name Of Former State Mufti

This magnificent building built under the Sixth National Development Plan is a secondary school, named after Brunei Darussalam's former State Mufti, the late Pehin Datu Seri Maharaja Dato Seri Utama Dr. Awang Haji Ismail bin Omar Abdul Aziz, in honour of his great contributions and services as well as his noble charac-

teristics as a theologian and intellect who was fond of reading, making research and writing. The new school which is now known as Pehin Datu Seri Maharaja Secondary School has a vision and a philosophy based on 'belief', 'dedication' and 'self reliance' concepts.

It was completed in November last year after twelve months of construction at a cost of some B\$20 million. Built on a 16 hectare site, the school caters for residents of the National Housing Scheme in Kampong Mentiri and the nearby villages.

Equipped with modern and up-to-date facilities, the school consists of administration, classroom, science and technical blocks as well as other amenities such as multi-purpose hall, canteen and a prayer hall to list a few.

It offers optional subjects such as commerce, home science, agricultural science, computer, woodwork and art.

It is Brunei-Muara district's 16th secondary school, and the 24th in the country.
