### New co-generation plant to meet energy demand

H is Majesty Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam officially opened the country's newest co-generation power plant on February 25, 1987.

His Majesty named the power station, sited on 9.3 hectares next to the Brunei LNG plant, the Sultan Haji Omar Ali Saifuddien Saadul Khairi Waddien Power Plant, in honour of his late father.

The plant which is a joint venture between the government and the private sector consists of seven gas-fired turbines with a total output of 147 Mw.

Waste heat from the turbines is being utilised at the nearby liquefied natural gas plant to fire boilers in its energy-intensive process. This is expected to bring substantial energy savings to the largely government-owned Brunei LNG Sendirian Berhad, the firm that operates the liquefied natural gas plant.

Almost all the population enjoys electricity in Brunei Darussalam and domestic growth in electricity consumption has been 10 percent per annum.

The new electricity generators will also supply power to the Belait District where the country's oil and gas industry is located. The Belait District used to have its own plant.

Work on the plant began at the end of 1984 and the contract was awarded to a consortium of Toyo Engineering Corporation of Japan and John Brown Engineering of Britain.

### Towards a diversified economy

L ong term forecasts on the world oil and gas markets coupled with the national sustained yield policy on hydrocarbon production makes it imperative to plan for diversifying the economy.

From 1985 shakes descended on the world oil market and this has had not an unpalpable effect on Brunei Darussalam's earnings from that commodity. Last year, for instance, recorded a 50 percent drop in income over 1985.

Virtually all commodities are imported into the Sultanate and a steadily climbing consumer price index tells of higher import prices with time.

In the spirit of self-sifficiency and more crucial, for strategic reasons it vital, if not as urgent, that the economy diversifies away from oil and gas.

As it stands 90 percent of food is imported and the domestic agricultural sector only attracts academic dropouts or other unemployables.

Advocate of free enterprise as this paper is, the hand of policy makers is a necessary evil to shift momentum on a creature as ethereal yet undynamic as a stuck mentality.

For starters jobs in the desired sectors of the economy should receive resolute patronage that includes better salaries, benefits and protection.

Agricultural inputs, be they fertiliser, advice or other assistance could be systematically and rationally managed and tied to increased productivity. Farmers would appreciate guaranteed prices that reward quality as well as quantity of produce.

Whatever is done it is results that count as they are the only real measure of success.

## Foreign Affairs Minister in talks with NZ, Aussie leaders

His Royal Highness also paid a courtesy call on The Right Honourable Mr Robert J L

Hawke, the Australian Prime Minister. He was also received by Sir Ninian Stephen, the Australian Governor-General.

Earlier Brunei Darussalam's Foreign Minister made his first official visit to New Zealand where he held talks with Mr David Lange, New Zealand's Prime Minister Discussions also touched on ways to improve the ASEAN-New Zealand dialogue of which Brunei Darussalam is the current chairman.

In the royal entourage to both countries were Her Royal Highness Pengiran Anak Isteri Pengiran Anak Zariah and senior Foreign Affairs Ministry officials.

### New business closing times

The Municipal Board has announced new closing times for businesses in the capital.

A circular directed at restaurants and coffee shops, retailers and operators of barber saloons, became effective on February 1, 1987.

The new closing time for barber saloons is 8.00 p.m., retail shops 9.30 p.m. while restaurants and coffee shops are allowed to remain open till 10.30 p.m.

The penalty for breaking the regulations, issued under the Miscellaneous Licensing Act, is the cancellation of business licences.

No opening times were stated in the circular.

Fruit seedlings, planting skills and manpower and free refreshments all volunteered by local residents have been fueling the beginnings of a nation-wide fruit tree planting effort to put more greenery on beaches and other parts of the Sultanate.

The gotong royong (self-help) initiated by the government, began last National Day on February 23, 1987 with coconut planting events at several of the country's beaches.

The Pehin Orang Kaya Setia Bakti Diraja Dato Laila Utama Haji Awang Isa, Special Adviser to His Majesty and Home Affairs Minister was guest of honour at one of the ceremonies.

A spokesman said that in addition to beautification the coconut palms could also play a role in controlling soil erosion and providing shade in several of the beaches which are recreation areas.

Other parts of the ongoing programme of tree planting will involve the planting of indigenous species of fruit trees which are be-

ing threatened with extinction because more exotic imported species were gaining ground in the country.

All the planting materials and manpower in the programme have been donated. Volunteers to do the planting have come from social groups, professional and trade associations and even from the diplomatic corps.

So far some 10,000 coconut palms have been planted and another 12,000 seedlings are yet to be used up.

The Seri Begawan Religious Teacher Training College in the capital held its 11th convocation last month.

The function held on March 7, 1987 had some 232 graduates including 172 women receiving their certificates after completing a three-year course in last year.

Guest of honour at the function was Pehin Orang Kaya Ratna Diraja Dato Seri Utama Ustaz Haji Awang Mohd. Zain bin Haji Serudin, the Religious Affairs Minister who also presented graduation certificates and best student awards.

Last year's awards went to Awang Ibrahim bin Alikhan and Dayang Norsiah binti Haji Abdullah while Dayang Hajjah Masni binti Bungsu and Dayang Norleha binti Haji Nordin received best student awards for 1985.

Speaking at the function Pehin Haji Awang Mohd. Zain said that it was the duty of religious teachers to imbue their students with Islamic values.

He also hoped that with the increase in numbers of trained teachers in the country, the teaching of Islam in Brunei Darussalam would be stepped up.

## 232 graduate from religious college



ASEAN diplomats were among those who attended a National Day function hosted by Brunei Darussalam's Washington mission.

His Excellency Pengiran Dato Paduka Haji Idris, the Ambassador's guests included State Department officials and diplomats based in the US capital.

## ASEAN population experts meet

The 10th ASEAN Population Programme Heads and Experts meeting was held in Bandar Seri Begawan beginning March 18, 1987.

The Programme was set up after the declaration of ASEAN Concord in Bali in 1976.

In his keynote and opening address to the meeting Dato Paduka Seri Laila Jasa Haji Ahmad Wally Skinner, Deputy Finance Minister said that there was a universal need to improve living standards of the ASEAN peoples even though the population dynamics in various parts of the region differ

'Certainly the very object of solidarity and co-operation is

about peoples and it is the togetherness of these peoples that will drive ASEAN to reach out for higher goals,' the Deputy Minister said

The meeting also prepared reports for consideration at the ASEAN summit meeting scheduled to be held in Manila in December this year.

The ASEAN summit is expected to deal with a wide variety of economic issues and the population component of these will also be considered.

The question of integrating population with development, urbanisation and other demographic indicators like ageing and infant mortality rate are also exoccted to be raised.

### Submarine cable link to Singapore

The governments of Brunei Darussalam and Singapore have agreed to build a submarine optical fibre cable linking the two countries.

The signing ceremony for the agreement, which took place in Singapore, on February 19, 1987, paves the way for improved telecommunications between the two countries and within ASEAN. When complete at the end of the decade, at the cost US \$50 million, all the ASEAN countries would be connected by a network of submarine communication cables.

Brunei Darussalam was represented at the agreement signing ceremony by Awang Haji Chuchu bin Panglima Asgar Dato Paduka Awang Haji Abdullah, the Permanent Secretary at the Communications Ministry with Mr Tan Guong Ching, Permanent Secretary at the Singapore Ministry of Communications and Information signing for his government.

Last month Siemens AG of Germany signed a \$34.6 million contract with the Brunei Darussalam government to supply and install 47,000 lines of Stored Programme Control (SPC) digital exchange which will have 11 exchanges, and 17 remote subscriber units.





At the signing Awang Haji Chuchu represented the government while Siemens of Germany was represented by Dr H Baur, Deputy President of the firm's Public Switching Systems Division.

When ready the new exchange will also make possible international direct dialling on an additional 8000 lines.

The first exchange is expected to be ready by next year.

### One-stop store opens

Y aohan Department Store of Japan last month opened its sixth outlet in ASEAN, a \$24.4 million investment in Bandar Seri Begawan.

The Brunei Darussalam store is a joint enterprise with local businessman Haji Awang Abdul Hapidz Laksamana who is also President of the Malay Chamber of Commerce.

The latest Yaohan outlet was officially opened by Her Royal Highness Princess Masna on March 20, 1987 to the accompaniment of *taiko* music by *happi*-clad girls. Also present at the opening was Mr Kazuo Wada, President of Yaohan Japan.

Earlier at a press conference Mr Wada said that the store could help to stem the cash outflow when Bruneians seeking upmarket shopping spent their money to other cities in the region. He added that the strong Japanese yen has made overseas investment easier for Yaohan.

Haji Awang Abdul Hapidz, who through Abdul Razak Holdings holds, 30 percent of the partnership in Yaohan Brunei said that the political and economic stability and the relatively high per capita income in the Sultanate had been important factors in opening the new store.

Like its sister stores in Singapore, Hong Kong, USA, Costa Rica and Japan the local outlet is a one-stop family store combining shopping and leisure. It stocks anything from home applicances, furniture, interior furnishings, jewellery and clothing. Also on the premises are a number of cooked food outlets.

Attending the opening ceremony were His Excellency Mr T Kawamura, the Japanese Ambassador to Brunei Darussalam and other diplomats.

### Stamps into the drug-abuse fight



B runei Darussalam has issued a set of stamps to mark the country's anti drug-abuse campaign.

The set of commemorative stamps issued on March 15, 1987 consists of three stamps in the 10 sen, 75 sen and \$1 denominations.

Designs on the stamps were adapted from entries in the national anti drug-abuse poster competition held recently. All the entries used in the stamps were by school and college students.

The stamp (picture) was adapted from a poster entered by Arman bin Mohd Zaman of Serasa Secondary School. The legend in Malay roughly translates as 'Drugs, national enemy No. 1.'

Overseas collectors can obtain the stamps by writing to the Philatelic Bureau, Postmaster-General, Brunei Darussalam to make a standing order. Requests for a standing order should be accompanied by a minimun deposit of \$30.

### Top scouters meet



### Brunei Malay in a minute

Every month in the Brunei Darussalam newsletter readers are introduced to common Malay words as used in this country. This month the word selected is piasau.

Piasau is the Brunei Malay word for coconut, the fruit of the cocos nucifera or coconut palm. It is a hard-shelled nut filled with a sweet juice or 'milk' that makes a pleasant drink. The kernel of the nut, a solid white meat, can be dried and this is copra.

The kernel is also an ingredient in local sweetmeats. If it is grated and pressed a thick creamy juice is obtained which is an essential addition to many local dishes especially curries. The standard Malay term for the same would be 'kelapa'.



W orld Forestry Day which fell on March 21. 1987 was celebrated in Brunei Darussalam with tree planting and a seminar on the appreciation of timber, both activities being organised by the government Forestry Department.

The theme for this year's celebrations was 'Forests the prosperity of the nation'.

The tree planting, led by Awang Haji Mohd Yassin bin Ampuan Salleh, the Director of the department, took place on 2.6 hectares of nursery land at Sungai Liang. The local species tulong (agathis Alba) was planted.

The seminar, held on March 23 and 24, 1987 was open to the public. Speakers at the seminar, attended largely by architects, and those from the construction industry, included Awang Wong Tuck Meng, Forestry Officer and Mr Choo Kheng Ten, Senior Research Officer from the Forestry Research Institute of Malaysia.

More than three quarters of Brunei Darussalam is covered with forest of which 39 percent is presently forest reserve.

Five recreational areas for public use have been carved out of forest reserves through out the country. These have trails, jogging tracks and rest places.

## Village-style roof for diplomatic decisions

This kampung style-roofed building, home to the offices of the Foreign Affairs Ministry, has become a architerctural landmark in the Sultanate.

The building designed by the government Public Works Department is in three blocks, two of them with five floors while the middle one has an extra floor.

The Foreign Affairs Ministry building completed in 1983 sits on a hillock about two kilometres from the capital city Bandar Seri Begawan.

A walk up the rather steep access road to the building rewards the visitor with a splendid view of Kampong Ayer (water village) especially in the early morning and at dusk.

It is in this building that the Foreign Affairs Minister receives his official guests on courtesy calls or for meetings.
