

Peace, stability a must for regional d'ment

Informal labour sector and working environment discussed at ASEAN Labour Ministers Meeting.



His Majesty Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam.

Brunei Darussalam's principal objectives of attaining peace, progress and prosperity prompted the Sultanate to join ASEAN in January 1984, seven days after resuming full independence and sovereignty.

His Majesty Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam sees ASEAN as dedicated to the same goals.

His Majesty was speaking before officially opening the Sixth ASEAN Labour Ministers Meeting that began in Bandar Seri Begawan on November 27, 1986.

Brunei Darussalam's commitment to ASEAN included seconding a senior civil servant to the position of Secretary-General at the ASEAN Secretariat, 'despite

our shortage of personnel,' His Majesty added.

His Majesty, who is also the Sultanate's Prime Minister said that the success of ASEAN was manifold.

'It is not only successful in political cooperation but also in the field of social and cultural collaboration. The most tangible success of the Association is its direct contribution to regional peace.'

The success and growth of the group economies was also attributed to the stable and peaceful environment in the region.

The drug abuse menace also drew attention from His Majesty who suggested that the adverse economic situation had led to 'dislocation of industries and a rise in unemployment and social problems.' The energies of youth should be harnessed and channel-

ed towards society's development efforts, His Majesty urged.

His Majesty expressed confidence that critics of ASEAN would be proved wrong as the Association coped with the challenges of the years ahead. 'Hard work, political will and a continuing firm commitment to the ideals of ASEAN' will guide it through the decades to come, the royal address continued.

On the future economic development of the ASEAN nations, His Majesty said that he shared the belief among the Association's leaders that peace and stability should be maintained.

"The continuing importance of ASEAN is beyond doubt' His Majesty said and added the commitment to the association should be

Love of labour

A n essential pre-requisite to any social or economic progress is peace and stability, not just domestically but within the borders of our neighbours.

Here more than in many areas of international life does the dictum 'no man is an island' hold court. One only needs to recall the difficulties posed by conflict-ridden peninsula-mates to Thailand or south asian neighbours to Pakistan.

Hence the attribution by His Majesty Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam to the regional peace and stability for ASEAN economic growth is royalty right; and they are not merely existing but making if not spectacular, then, enviable progress.

The importance of a skilled, disciplined and rightly motivated workforce in the pursuance of ASEAN's economic and social goals hardly needs mention.

In this connection it is both timely and appropriate to welcome the setting up of a 'Working conditions and environment' project to be based in Jakarta. The project has been given priority status.

ASEAN labour ministers must be congratulated for taking a prudent long-term view of the intricate labour function in their respective economies. Recognition given to the so-called informal labour sector and the desire to upgrade its contribution to economic development while at the same time bestowing upon it protection and benefits is to be applauded.

ASEAN need never emulate the western model of labour relations in which riding roughshod is the accepted style of play.

Informal labour sector to get more protection

The sixth ASEAN Labour Ministers Meeting last month voiced its serious concern over increasing protectionism which was affecting industrial relations, employment and productivity of ASEAN countries.

In a joint statement the Labour Ministers agreed that the infor-

mal sector of the economy be given 'adequate protection and benefits' and its capacity to contribute to economic development be upgraded.

The statement also called on ILO, UNDP and donor countries to increase assistance to ASEAN countries.

LNG now shipped in home-owned tankers

A new company has joined the Brunei Shell Group bringing yet another aspect of the country's oil and gas industry under local ownership.

The formation of Brunei Shell Tankers (BST) Private Limited was announced on December 3, 1986 in Bandar Seri Begawan. BST jointly owned by the Brunei Darussalam government and the Royal Dutch/Shell Group will infuture transport all the country's liquefied natural gas to customers in Japan.

The seven tankers, dedicated to the transport of LNG from the Sultanate to Japan, formerly owned by Shell Tankers (UK) Limited, have been bought over by BST and registered locally. They will however continue to be operated under a management contract with the former owners.

Earnings from transportation of LNG will now come to the Sultanate.

The seven tankers each with a capacity of 75,000 cubic metres have been renamed. They are now known as Bebatik (formerly Gadinia), Bekalang (Gadila), Bekulan (Gari), Belais (Gastrana), Belanak (Gouldia), Bilis (Geomitra) and Bubuk (Genota).

The increased government involvement in the LNG business comes after nearly two years of negotiations among the shareholders.

A Brunei Shell statement said

that the new arrangements are designed to 'provide more extensive opportunities within that industry for local citizens.'

Government now biggest shareholder in LNG business

The Brunei Darussalam government has become the single largest partner in the country's liquefied natural gas business increasing its stake from one third to 50 percent.

The new agreement was signed in Bandar Seri Begawan with the Royal Dutch/Shell Group and the Mitsubishi Corporation of Japan on December 3,1986. His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Digadong Sahibul Mal Pengiran Muda Jefri Bolkiah, the Finance Minister represented the government.

Originally the Brunei LNG Private Limited and the Brunei Coldgas Private Limited were owned equally by the Royal Dutch/Shell Group, the Mitsubishi Corporation and the government. The new structure has the government holding half the shares with the balance shared equally between the two other partners.

The Brunei Shell Petroleum (BSP) Company Private Limited, the exploration and production arm of the Brunei Shell Group, countinues to remain a 50-50 government-Shell business.

BSP also operates a 10,000barrels-per-day refinery producing all the sultanate's needs in gasoline, kerosene, avgas and diesel fuel. Last year BSP produced a daily average of 165,000 barrels of crude which is mainly exported to ASEAN countries, Japan, the United States, Korea and Taiwan.

Gas produced by BSP, which last year averaged 750 MMSCF per day, is sold to the Brunei LNG Company Private Limited.

Brunei LNG sells the liquefied natural gas to Japan on a 20-year contract that expires in 1992. The company has established a reputation for reliable and stable supplies of the commodity.

His Majesty Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam renamed the LNG tankers in a ceremony on December 6, 1986, at the Brunei LNG plant in Lumut, 80 kilometres south of the capital.

Speaking at the ceremony His Majesty said that the arrangements represent an important step in the evolution of the long-standing relationship between his government and the other partners.

The royal party which included His Majesty's three brothers, His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Perdana Wazir Sahibul Himmah Wal-Waqar Pengiran Muda Mohamed Bolkiah, the Foreign Affairs Minister, His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Bendahara Seri Maharaja Permaisuara Pengiran Muda Haji Sufri Bolkiah and His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Digadong Sahibul Mal Pengiran Muda Jefri Bolkiah, the Finance Minister later boarded the jetty train for a five-kilometre trip to inspect the Geomitra which His Majesty renamed Bilis.

New firm to start offshore exploration

A new joint venture Jasra-Elf Ventures will begin exploring for oil and gas in deep waters offshore Brunei Darussalam this year.

This was announced on December 11, 1986. Jasra Jackson Private Limited, (a company name change has been applied for), a wholly-owned local company will team up with Elf Acquitaine Offshore AS Asia B.V., a subsidiary of the French industrial giant ELF Acquitaine to work concession held by the former.

The move represents the largest French investment in the country to date.

The agreement commits Elf Acquitaine Offshore Asia to spend at least US\$15 million in the first two contract years on seismic work and to drill at least one well. If it decides to continue in the venture it is expected to invest another US\$20 million in exploration work for a further two years.


The petroleum mining agreement with the government has about four years to be fulfilled.

Dr Rolf J Wenger, General Manager of Elf Acquitaine's International Exploration and New Ventures Division said in Bandar Seri Begawan, 'Jasra's local expertise and our worldwide experience in the petroleum industry could bring mutual benefit.'

Elf Acquitaine has production sharing agreements with Pertamina in Indonesia and in Malaysia have a concession block north of Bintulu, offshore Sarawak. The company also does some work offshore China.

His Majesty Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam officiated at the opening of the sixth ASEAN Labour Ministers Meeting which began in Bandar Seri Begawan on November 27, 1986. Below are excerpts from the royal address:

Why the Sultanate joined

We see ASEAN as an association dedicated to the attainment of peace, progress and prosperity for the region. These are also Brunei Darussalam's principal objectives. Brunei Darussalam therefore joined ASEAN seven days after its resumption of full independence and sovereignty in January 1984.

Having been a member of the Association for almost three years, we can say that Brunei Darussalam takes an active part in the activities of the Association, despite our shortage of personnel. We have shown our commitment to ASEAN by seconding one of our senior officers to be the Secretary-General of the ASEAN Secretariat.

Joint effectiveness

Many critics have commented that ASEAN is a one-issue Association, for, to them ASEAN's achievement is associated with the question of Kampuchea. In my view, however, the success of ASEAN is manifold. It is not only successful in political co-operation, but also in the field of social and cultural collaboration. The success and growth of the ASEAN economies in the last decade can be attributed to the stable and peaceful environment in our region.

Drug abuse menace

The fall in the prices of commodities, including oil, has affected our economies, leading to dislocation of industries and a rise in unemployment and social problems. One of the social problems facing many countries today is drug abuse. We are aware that many of our youth are involved in drug abuse. They become a problem to society and the effect can be so damaging that it can even threaten the national security of a country. We must therefore harness and channel the energies of our youth towards the development of our society. I am glad to say that this problem is recognised both regionally and internationally, and both in ASEAN and at the United Nations, great efforts are being made to combat this menace.

Time of challenge

The coming years therefore will be a testing time for our Association. It is a challenge which I feel we must face, for some critics have even questioned the relevance of ASEAN. We must prove to our detractors that they are wrong.

Our officials are now in the early stages of preparing for the ASEAN summit meeting to be held next year. I am confident that with hard work, political will, and a continuing firm commitment to the ideals of the Association, the ASEAN summit will give the Association a new impetus that will guide it through the decades to come.

ASEAN's continuing importance

I share the belief among ASEAN leaders that for our future economic development to continue, it is vital that peace and stability must be maintained. The continuing importance of ASEAN is beyond doubt. We must therefore ensure that our efforts are directed towards maintaining this commitment to ASEAN, not only among the present generation, but also among the generations to come. It is the youth and the future generation which we must educate so that they can pass on the torch of ASEAN burning more brightly.

The success and growth of the ASEAN economies in the last decade can be attributed to the stable and peaceful environment in our region.

Joint solutions

It is fitting that the vital question of human resource should be one of the areas where regional co-operation has been established. The importance of regional co-operation in the field of human resource was underlined by the decision reached in 1974 that

I share the belief among ASEAN leaders that for our future economic development to continue, it is vital that peace and stability must be maintained.

ASEAN Labour Ministers should meet every two years. The labour ministers meetings, since the one held in 1975, have achieved much success in the field of labour. This can be seen by efforts to increase co-operation among member countries to find solutions to current labour problems.

Workforce welfare

A number of projects were initiated such as the ASEAN Centre for Industrial Relations and the ASEAN Programme on the Improvement of Working Conditions and Environment. All these projects indicate ASEAN's concern to promote the quality, the standard and the wellbeing of the workforce in this region.

Economic diversification

Brunei Darussalam has no sizeable export industry apart from oil and gas. Despite the smallness of our local workforce, we share similar aspirations with other members of ASEAN on the need to generate economic growth as well as to diversify our economy. We have taken the necessary steps to develop our non-oil sectors by putting emphasis on the industrial and agricultural sectors. These objectives can only be achieved if the workforce is disciplined, rightly motivated and possesses the necessary technical know-how.

Important forum

We therefore see the ASEAN Labour Ministers Meeting as an important forum where close collaboration in the development and expansion of vital human resources in this region can be attained.

Her Majesty graces charity fair

The country's secretaries last month joined hands to do their bit for charity. They held a fair in the capital netting more than \$10,000.

Gracing the fair organised by the Brunei Society of Secretaries on December 21, 1986 was Her Majesty Raja Isteri Pengiran Anak Saleha who at the function commended them on their concern for the underprivileged.

Her Majesty also urged the secretaries to upgrade themselves professionally.

More than 30 local and private businesses put up stalls exhibiting and selling foodstuffs, toys, textiles, flowers and household items.

The other diplomat received at the Nurul Iman Palace on that day was His Excellency Mr Preet Mohan Singh Malik the Kuala Lumpur-based Indian High Commissioner.

Royal Defence Minister addresses armed forces

His Majesty Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam, also the country's Defence Minister last month visited the Berakas Garrison, his first visit since taking over the defence portfolio from his late father Sultan Haji Omar Ali Saifuddien Saadul Khairi Waddien.

At the garrison His Majesty addressed senior officers of the Royal Brunei Armed Forces and the Defence Ministry telling them that they played a vital role in national defence.

The Royal Defence Minister told them that security was the pre-condition for economic, social and political stability and that their effectiveness depended not so much on their size as a fighting force but on their discipline and dedication to military duties.

He called on the officers to lead

by examples that could be emulated by the men and to act firmly on those who breached the disciplinary rules. His Majesty also called on officers to check that their men did not become involved in drug-abuse which he said could 'weaken the national defence system and the whole nation.'

His Majesty stressed the need for greater professionalism in the way the armed forces carried out its duties and called for a continuous efforts to upgrade military skills so that the defence machinery was up-to-date and abreast with the latest military technology.

His Majesty was accompanied on the visit by Pehin Orang Kaya Laila Setia Bakti Diraja Dato Laila Utama Haji Awang Isa, Special Adviser to His Majesty the Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam cum Home Affairs Minister.



National Welfare Year 1986

L ast month saw the launching of National Welfare Year 1986 by Pehin Jawatan Luar Pekerma Raja Dato Seri Paduka Haji Awang Hussain, the Culture, Youth and Sports Minister.

Residents of Brunei Darussalam, whose main form of recreation is lifting booze-laden elbows, may face the prospect of hanging up their drinking glasses this year.

This sobering thought, enough to drive any man to drink, is the result of the government withdrawing liquir licences from coffee shops, restaurants and supermarkets. The licences which used to be issued for sixmonth periods expired at the end of last year.

The move, is consistent with the Sultanate's official religion, Islam, which forbids Muslims from consuming alcoholic drink.


In the past alcohol has been available at licensed retail outlets, certain coffeeshops and restaurants.

A restricted number of restaurants throughout the country have been given licences to continue serving alcohol to patrons. Leading hotels in the capital are among these.



rass betelnut boxes like these can be seen in every Bruneian home. Betelnut chewing is considered a social activity among the older generation, much like neighbours sharing a cup of tea elsewhere.

The trays are known as celapa and not just filled with betel nuts but the accessories for convenient and complete enjoyment of the chew. There are lime, betel

leaves and the betelnut cutter also in the tray.

The trays are hand-made by a local craftsmen who pick up the skills the apprentice route although fewer are entering the business.

The full betelnut tray has a culturally important role in many local ceremonies including weddings.


