

# UN reform needed to enable it better handle world affairs



Brunei Darussalam's Minister of Foreign Affairs, His Royal Highness Prince Mohamed Bolkiah addresses the 51st session of the United Nations General Assembly, in which he spoke of the need for UN reform to enable it better deal with growing world problems.

**B** runei Darussalam has added its voice to those of other members of the United Nations in calling for reform of the world body to enable it better handle world affairs.

In an address on 26 September in New York, the Sultanate's Foreign Affairs Minister, His Royal Highness Prince Mohamed Bolkiah told the fifty-first session of the United Nations General Assembly, UNGA, that the organisation needed a new approach to solve problems in many areas of international concern.

"This can only be developed, we feel, when the United Nations is reformed", he said, adding, "I say this because we are seeing a new type of international community, far more diverse than the one our

founders knew. At the same time, it is one which is being drawn closer together through the advance of technology and communications - the global village of popular description".

The need is urgent, the minister went on, while pointing to mounting tension and conflicts within nations as well as various social, economic and sometimes even criminal problems of international concerns which transcend national borders. The United Nations, he said, is increasingly being asked to solve these.

In trying to do all these work, which represents a deep commitment to the cause of peace and stability in the world, the UN resources are overstretched.

"I also tend to think that maybe we are asking them to take on new tasks with old or out-dated tools. If they are not provided with the means to manage our affairs well, then we at the United Nations are at fault".

He cited the Bosnian tragedy as a warning to the international community and described the current situation in the Middle East as another possible emblem of failure though there are still hopes for peace in the troubled region. The Middle East peace agreement, he said, gave a realistic glimpse of hope and optimism.

"However, a new government in Israel now appears to be challenging the very basis on which our fragile hopes for peace were founded".

Brunei Darussalam, he stressed, adds its voice to the many in urging Israeli leaders

to continue the peace process, "not just by statement, but in the full spirit of the agreements reached in Madrid and Oslo".

His Royal Highness also urged the UN Security Council to begin to insist that all agreements are resolutely kept.

He had earlier in the address expressed pleasure at the UNGA President's statements on the role of the General Assembly which emphasised on practical economic and social development.

"It was also most encouraging to hear you say that you intend to do all you can for the cause of the United Nations' reform", said the minister, while at the same time reminding that the General Assembly must not be paralysed by the analysis of reform.

"We need concrete proposals from our Working Groups. Then we can spend our time on the hard work of building consensus".

The Brunei Darussalam Foreign Minister said the emergence of the global village is welcomed, for it could mean that "we all learn to acknowledge and appreciate our diversity and take on the best aspects of a real village".

However, he also warned that there is no guarantee this can happen and villages are not always pleasant places to live in.

"Modern technology may well encourage neighbourly cooperation, but it is just as capable of enhancing the hostile elements of primitive life. It could set up a permanent

division between the developed and developing worlds".

These tremendous changes taking place today call for a new effective approach.

In Southeast Asia, the minister explained, an approach chosen has enabled the promotion of programmes aimed at preventive diplomacy and economic cooperation in the region.

His Royal Highness referred

to the intention of Cambodia, Laos and Myanmar to join the Association of Southeast Asian Nations or ASEAN, a move that will see the whole of Southeast Asia working together.

While in New York, His Royal Highness Prince Mohamed Bolkiah also attended a meeting of the Non-Aligned Movement or NAM.

In a brief address at the

NAM Meeting, the Brunei Darussalam Foreign Affairs Minister said that the movement has gone a long way towards fulfilling what were called for at the NAM Summit in Cartagena, Colombia last year.

As well he granted audiences to several ministers who were in New York for the fifty-first UNGA.

#### Serving the society


His Majesty also spoke on the important role of UBD in serving the society.

# Teachers: provider of education and exemplary qualities

T eachers have been urged to be at the forefront always in knowledge, skills and good qualities.

Speaking at the annual Teachers' Day gathering at the Brunei International Convention Centre on 23 September, His Majesty Paduka Seri Baginda Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam told teachers that their role is becoming ever more challenging not only as the provider of education, but also of good qualities to their proteges, especially in this age of constant change and rapid development in various fields.

He urged teachers to equip themselves with adequate skills and good qualities as well as to continuously upgrade their knowledge in order to be the role model to others.

The monarch further urged teachers to be alert and always willing to keep abreast of the rapid development in the information technology, otherwise they would be left behind, possibly even by their own students.

In spite of the various changes and the rapid development of information technology, modern education will still need genuinely committed teachers, said His Majesty.

"I am of the opinion that technology alone will not be adequate to assume the role of the teacher as an educator no matter what changes time may bring".

Towards producing qualified teachers, His Majesty explained that the government, through the

Ministry of Education, is providing a special scholarship scheme to attract qualified and interested students to take up teaching courses in science, mathematics and English language.

He further explained that the effort is designed to obtain teachers from select students.

"This scheme does not limit opportunities towards enabling students become mere classroom teachers, but would also enable them pursue studies in teaching up to the first degree level and further".

His Majesty touched on the theme of this year's Teachers' Day celebration - "Towards shaping noble morals'.

He said moral problems are not



easily solved, even schools and high learning institutions sometimes fail to address them. But among the effective means of instilling good morals he pointed, are through education and examples set by both parents and teachers.

"Parents and teachers and the family are responsible towards setting good examples to their children", said His Majesty, while pointing that the good examples they set will produce good people and vice-versa.

Earlier in his address, the monarch called on Islamic scholars throughout the world to come forward and project the right impression that all forms of

discoveries which have been made for the benefit of mankind are derived from the Al-Qur'an, although they may not have been stated directly in the holy book.

"Today we have come face to face with the reality that many subjects which at first man did not think of but have now come into existence, such as motorised transportation as trains, motor cars, airplanes and spacecraft are new phenomena which the Al-Qur'an made reference to", said His Majesty.

This is the secret of the Koran in

pointing to the technology of communications.

"But, it is regrettable that sometimes people do not see it from this aspect, only as far as regarding that such discoveries are made by other people and not inspired from the sources of the holy book", lamented the ruler.

Islamic scholars need to point to and correct these vague perceptions, he stressed.

His Majesty spoke of the challenges the 21st century may bring.

While illiteracy was something to be feared in olden days, today people are talking about emotional and computer literacy. It is therefore not improbable that the next century will bring discoveries that are even more sublime.

The gathering was attended by some 3,000 teachers from throughout the country. The highlight was the presentation of awards to three teachers - both serving and retired - for their contribution and excellence in the teaching profession.

### New houses and land grants for residents in Tutong district

H is Majesty Paduka Seri Baginda Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam has presented more house keys and land grants: this time to residents in the Tutong district.

Some 126 families on 1 October

received the keys to houses under the National Housing Scheme at Kampong Bukit Beruang, 62 others received the houses under the Housing Scheme for Landless Citizens at Kampong Telisai, while a further 141 people received land grants.

The presentation was held at the

# Collaborative Research Sought To Face Complex Education Problems

The Minister of Education has stressed the importance of conserving the limited pool of researchers in the Sultanate by investing in collaborative research in facing complex educational problems that require long-term solutions.

Yang Berhormat Pehin Orang Kaya Laila Wijaya Dato Seri Setia Awang Haji Abdul Aziz, the Minister of Education made this remark amid concern over whether the variety of research studies that have been conducted could have helped, or are helpful, in developing and further improving the country's educational system.

"By the same token, we should involve the large pool of practitioners who have the potential of becoming partners in collaborative research," the minister further said in his speech at the opening of the National Colloquium: Towards Developing and Strengthening Partnerships in Teacher Education held on 16 September.

He cited that two workshops have already been conducted involving representatives from University Brunei Darussalam, the Ministry of Education and schools in developing collaborative agenda for research in education.

#### Major areas of research

He said five major areas for research have emerged, namely motivation to learn, motivation to teach, developing professional competence, developing language proficiency and enhancing research and planning.

He went on to say that these areas address the more significant and persistent problems facing the educational system.

While some projects are already underway and several more are in the pipeline, other serious researchers and potential researchers, too, would make a genuine effort to undertake studies

that could become part of the collaborative agenda, stressed the minister.

In this regard, he urged for concerted effort to deal with the problems systematically, on what really works or does not work in Brunei Darussalam.

The minister also expressed concern over the danger of viewing research as the panacea for all educational ills.

"However, research would have even less to contribute if each researcher goes his or her own separate way, without attempting to relate to each other and to the priority areas of research," he said.

Therefore, greater commitment should be shown towards the agenda that has already been identified, he pointed.

#### Research on effective partnership urged

The minister noted that one such area which could be included to the agenda on research of teacher education is research on effective partnerships in teacher education.

"If teacher educators are to set a good example for teachers to follow, they should take the initiative to conduct research to improve their own professional practice before they attempt to urge teachers to be involved in reflective action research."

He added: "The research on teacher education could also be a collaborative effort, for school and the ministry are as much involved in teacher professional development as the university."

Earlier in his speech, he welcomed efforts by University Brunei Darussalam to involve school personnel as well as education officers from the Education Ministry in its many teacher education programmes.

### Collaborative efforts by ministry towards teacher education

He pointed that from time to time his ministry would also initiate some special projects in teacher education, which would invariably be conceived as collaborative projects involving the university, the ministry and schools.

For instance, the Education Ministry has been collaborating with the university to introduce a Certificate in Special Education programme for preparing Learning Assistance Teachers for all schools in effort to provide for the special needs of children with learning difficulties.

Another recent initiative was the in-service training of specialist science and mathematics teachers.

He said that it is encouraging that the teachers are asking for more and with the help of equally enthusiastic university dons and ministry officers, follow-up school-based workshops are continuing to be held.

Another initiative was a teacher induction programme held last year

for all newly-graduating teachers.

Besides briefings by the ministry's officers on the roles of different departments vis-a-vis schools, five workshops were conducted by university lecturers, school principals and headteachers.

Using such techniques as brainstorming, case study and role play, the workshops help the new teachers answer many questions, including the most basic but extremely important, such as, on how should a teacher prepare himself/herself for the first day of schools or for the first few months of the profession.

#### Importance of collaborative endeavours

The minister further noted that one interesting and important feature in these collaborative endeavours is the incorporation of research and evaluation.

For example, in conducting the Certificate in Special Education programme, the participants are involved in gathering useful data, such as the basic levels of reading and mathematics among school children.

In the in-service courses for specialist science and mathematics teachers, the participants are involved in conducting action research in their respective schools. And for the teacher induction workshops, the beginner teachers have been sensitised to the possibilities of utilising and conducting research in seeking answers to some of their problems in the classrooms. Besides the end-of-course evaluation, a follow-up evaluation is being envisaged, the minister said.

#### Ministry undertakes major review of primary education

In his speech, the Minister of Education also announced that his ministry is currently undertaking a major review of primary education, conducted also by representatives from the university and schools, which is nearing completion.

He noted that one major finding is that the system is too examinationoriented, whereby much time is being spent in preparing for examinations instead of real learning, especially in important areas of development of the whole child that are non-examinable at present.

In order to find a viable alternative to such a deep-rooted problem, he said, longer term research studies are necessary.

#### National Colloquium

The National Colloquium was organised by Universiti Brunei Darussalam. It was attended by some 200 participants comprising officials of the Education Ministry and the Institute of Education as well as school teachers from both the primary and the secondary. The participants, among others heard lectures from local and foreign education experts, such as from Britain and Australia.

## Ministry of Education to support human resources development in agriculture, fisheries and forestry

The Ministry of education is now undertaking important initiative to support human resources development in the agricultural, fisheries and forestry sectors of the country's economy.

Towards this end, a new Vocational School under the provision of the Sixth National Development Plan, is currently being built on a spacious site at Wasan in the Brunei-Muara district. The school is expected to operate in mid 1998.

The Permanent Secretary of the Education Ministry, Dato Paduka Haji Ali Hashim said that in the agricultural field, the Ministry will offer young adults two-year training programmes in Nursery Operation, Farm Operation for fruits, vegetables, poultry and food handling and processing.

The Ministry expects an annual intake of 100 students into these agricultural programmes and each student will be given the opportunity to specialize in the second year of studies.

He said that the new school and other vocational schools are primarily aimed at training young people for employment. With the promising opportunity, graduates of the agricultural programmes will be in a position to seek employment as competent assistants in greenhouses, nurseries, garden centres and landscaping organisations or as lands maintenance personnel.

In a speech read by the Acting Director of Examinations, Pengiran Haji Mohammad Zain bin Pengiran Haji Lampoh, as his personal representative during the 42nd Meeting of the Governing Board of the Southeast East Asian Ministers of Education Organisation regional Centre for Graduate Study and Research in Agriculture (SEARCA) held at the SEAMEO-VOCTECH Centre on 1st October, the official stressed the need for concurrent parallel development in agricultural research to follow graduate study

activities.

In this way, he said, training obtained through SEARCA can continue and be further extended into research and development to produce innovative technologies to better serve farming communities.

He said that Brunei Darussalam is now working forward to actively collaborate with researchers and institutions through SEARCA to accelerate research in areas such as integrated pest management, QAQC in poultry production, post-harvest research in food crops and livestocks and development of indigenous fruits for niche markets.


#### **Sultan grants audience to British Armed Forces' Commander**

The visiting military chief, who was accompanied at the audience by the British High Commissioner to Brunei Darussalam, His Excellency Mr. Ivan Callan, was on a three-day visit prior to his retirement.

Sir Peter Inge has been Commander of the Armed Forces of the United Kingdom since March 1994, and his visit has further strengthened the relations, especially in military aspects, between Brunei Darussalam and the United Kingdom.

Military cooperation between the two countries were formally affirmed with the signing of a five-year Defence Agreement in 1992.

#### UBD's Mace replaced by 'Mushaf Al-Qur'an'



#### Koranic generation needs to be produced for revival of Muslim ummahs' superiority

The pre-eminence of the Muslim ummahs can be revived only if the goal of producing a Koranic generation is achieved world-wide, where every Muslim is able not only to read the Al-Qur'an (Koran) but also practises its teachings fully, stressed His Majesty Paduka Seri Baginda Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam.

The Koran, added His Majesty, is not merely meant to be possessed, but it should be read and its teachings absorbed and put into practice.

The mere act of every Muslim reading the holy book and practising its teachings is greater than triggering a weapon, the ruler further said in his titah (royal address) on 13 October, at the end of the two-day Annual Koran Reading Competition, held at the Brunei International Convention Centre.


"This is because all the glory and victory of Muslims and the humiliation inflicted upon their enemies are handed down by Allah the Almighty".

His Majesty reminded, however, this did not mean that Muslims did not need weapons to defend themselves, on the contrary they are indeed required to strengthen their defences and security.

Hence, Muslims should intensify their involvement and relationships with the Koran by reading it and making it a guide so that their every struggle and activity will be blessed and assisted by Allah the Almighty.

#### Efforts to create learned generation on Al-Qur'an

Domestically, His Majesty pointed that the approach emphasises on more efforts on conducting various incentive schemes to promote the learning of the Al-Qur'an. This includes the provision of places for learning, distribution of the 'Mushaf Al-Qur'an' (A specially-handwritten edition of the al-Qur'an undertaken by His Majesty's Government and have been distributed since its launching in 1992) to Muslim families, and the formation of the Tahfiz Al-Quran Institut (Institute

for studies and Memorizing of the Al-Qur'an) and others.



The existing relations between Brunei Darussalam and Australia were stepped up further recently with the visit of the Chief Minister of Australia's Northern Territory, The Honourable Mr. Shane Stone.

During the two-day working visit, commencing 19 October, the minister was granted an audience at Istana Nurul Iman by His Majesty Paduka Seri Baginda Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam.

He also had an audience with the Foreign Affairs Minister, His Royal Highness Prince Mohamed Bolkiah at the Balai Penghadapan, Bukit Kayangan near the capital, Bandar Seri Begawan.

During the audience with the Foreign Affairs Minister, the visiting Australian minister was accompanied by the Director of the Paspaley Group of Companies, Mr. Nick Paspaley. Their discussions focussed on matters of mutual interest to the two countries, as well as on Australia's involvement in the Brunei Darussalam-Indonesia-Malaysia-Philippines-East ASEAN Growth Area or BIMP-EAGA.

Brunei Darussalam is currently

the country-coordinator of the ASEAN-Australia dialogue on a three-year tenure.

In June this year, the Sultanate hosted the 17th ASEAN-Australia Forum - during which the head of the Australian delegation emphasised that the Australian government placed high priority towards maintaining close relationship with its ASEAN neighbours, and noted that Australia's interest in doing business with ASEAN was evident in the strong private sector participation at the forum.

### Prince presents foundation's assistance in Temburong

His Royal Highness Prince Haji Al-Muhtadee Billah, the eldest son of His Majesty presented the keys of two houses built under the Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Foundation's Housing Scheme to help needy residents in the Temburong district on 3 October.

Only with proper guidance and attention from parents can we ensure that our teenagers live their teenage years in the best possible way," Her Majesty stressed.



#### **HRH Visits Women's Company of RBAF**

Hajjah Mariam has visited the Women's Company of the Royal Brunei Armed Forces (RBAF), of which she is Colonel-Commandant.

The visit on 25 September was in conjunction with the 15th anniversary of the company's formation.

Her Royal Highness was welcomed at the company's headquarters by the Commander of the RBAF, Yang Dimuliakan Pehin Datu Harimau Padang Major General Dato Paduka Seri Haji Awang Husin and the Commanding Officer of the Women's Company, Major Hajjah Sopiah Haji Hussaini.

In a briefing, Major Hajjah Sopiah

said that the company will continue to make effort to be more progressive and keep abreast with the development in various aspects of the military in order to be able to face challenges of the 21st century.

To date, the company has 600 personnel, stationed in Muara, Penanjong and Berakas attached to the several units, including the administration, finance, training and logistics. They are also attached to the fields of communications, technical (aircraft and electronics), dental, medical, military police, logistic accountants, storekeeping, transportation as well as training.

The Women's Company was formed

on 29 June, 1981. The first intake consisted of five locals as Cadet Officers and 22 recruits.

On 1 January 1995, His Majesty The Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam consented to give women personnel bonuses and pensions after 15 years service, aimed at attracting more capable females to the army. Other benefits include personal loans, housing and posting opportunity similar to those for male personnel.

After the briefing, Her Royal Highness toured an exhibition on the development of the company.

She also visited the Hangar of the Royal Brunei Air Force at the Berakas Garrison, as well as the Dental and Medical Centre.

### Malnutrition remained a problem among children:

#### Health Minister

The Minister of Health has said that malnutrition is still a problem among children living in certain parts of the country

The problem was due to insufficient dietary intake which may be related to social condition and insufficient vital food source, including financial problem and the preference on buying the less needed items, he pointed out.

The observation was based on the findings of a nutritional study conducted in 1995, involving pregnant mothers and children below the age of five years.

The study also showed that some pregnant mothers are still exposed to anaemia.

Expressing the concern before he officially launched the Survey on National Nutritional Status 1996 at the International Convention Centre on 10 October, Dato Paduka Dr. Haji Johar highlighted that obesity resulting

from over eating also remained a problem in the country. Obesity may cause heart disease, cerebrovascular and diabetes, which are the nation's major health problems

The Ministry of Health, he added, is making an effort to study and analyse nutritional problems in order to update and further strengthen programmes and nutritional policy in the country.

The Ministry also gives concern to the upgrading of nutritional status of the citizens and people of the country, particularly among children, pregnant mothers and the elderly and conduct programmes on a balanced and healthy nutrition.

He hoped that the study will produce in-depth findings, involving all levels of age, which in turn will enable concerned party to analyse the existing situation and provide more comprehensive programmes.

determinants of the quality of community life.

"At the same, the family, as the basic social and economic institution, is greatly affected by the social problems associated with economic change, whether it be rapid economic growth or economic stagnation, especially in the context of advancing globalisation of the world economy", said the Acting Minister.

In a ceremony held at the Riverview Inn in Gadong on 24th September, he said that it has become necessary for both family function and structure to adapt to the processes of change in order to ensure family survival.

The Acting Minister also spoke on changes in the relationship between women and men, resulting from major advances in education among women and significant increases in their participation in the labour force.

The boundaries of the gender

division of labour between productive and reproductive roles are gradually being crossed as women have started to enter formerly male-dominated areas of work and men have started to accept greater responsibility for domestic tasks, including child care.

The Seminar-Forum seeks to promote an enabling environment and support systems for women's entry into non-traditional occupations notwithstanding the diverse roles they have to play in society.

He hoped that the forum would see the start of the creation of networks among government agencies and private organisations leading to greater understanding and concerted efforts at dealing with issues and problems of common interest, that is the family.

#### Business community urged to make 'SHuTT' a reality

The business community in Brunei Darussalam has been urged to make the Sultanate's vision of becoming the service Hub for Trade and Tourism or 'SHuTT' a reality.

The call was made by the Permanent Secretary of the Communications Ministry, Dato Paduka Malai Haji Ali, at a gathering session between officials from the ministry and trading community which was held at the ministry on 7 October.

Meanwhile, with the rapid pace of technical education and in order to meet the need for lecturers and technical teachers, a post-graduate programme in technical education will be implemented next year.

Relevant courses are also offered at the certificate level, such as in creative writing.

In the field of research, UBD has placed Brunei Darussalam in the world map through its Tropical Rain Forest Research Centre at Kuala Belalong.

Research-related activities on relevant fields pertaining to the country also continue - The Brunei Academy Studies will continue conducting studies on the development of the people and the country.

The UBD Vice-Chancellor also pointed that several research centres are to be established such as the Applied Research in Education Centre and the Bilingual Education and Learning Method Research Centre.

Already, several universities in the region as well as in America and Sweden have expressed their interest and commitment to cooperate in the bilingualism and learning method fields, the Vice-Chancellor said.

#### Ceremony

During the ceremony, some 391 graduates received their degrees and certificates.

The monarch also presented honorary doctorate degrees to three people - two of them ministers and the other a statesman.

He said that "we can only be independent when we become an active producer, instead of a mere consumer. When this succeeds then we can influence and show others of the truth of the teachings of the Al-Qur'an, as our basis towards progress.

Towards this end, he called for diligent efforts, especially towards facing the challenges of 21st century such as in trade, acquisition of science and technology, increase in world population, environment pollution, the media and cultural diversity and other challenges.

He pointed that if we are not able to deal with these issues, then we will not

only lag behind, but we will also be unable to protect ourselves from deviationist influences that contradict the teachings of the Al-Qur'an.

We should, therefore, equip ourselves with knowledge and will towards progress in order to compete with others, and likewise, uphold the teachings enjoined by Allah the Almighty, the minister added.

The minister also spoke on the theme of the competition - 'Upgrading the Quality of Life Based on the Teachings of Islam."


