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
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

These sessions should be continued

from time to time, without waiting for the commencement of the LegCo meeting sessions.

"There are plenty of important issues to be discussed, such as the reduction in the government's fiscal due to unpredictable global oil price. What has happened to our nation's economic production? If there are any negative elements, how should they be addressed?" stressed His Majesty.

This also applies to other issues, such as the Employees Trust Fund (TAP) Scheme which still raises a major concern regarding its capacity to provide security for members who have families to support after retirement.

These can be examined at a discussion level, without the need to provide solutions or decisions, it is important to first look for diverse views, particularly among the appointed council members.

His Majesty was also aware that almost half of the allocated annual budget is employees' salary, with the reminder for recurring expenses.

Nevertheless, several projects under the Fiscal Consolidation programme introduced by the Ministry of Finance and Economy (MoFE) since financial year of 2018/2019 has already begun to produce results.

In this respect, senior officers, in particular, should show sensitivity and commitment towards any problems and complaints coming from officers and subordinates.

Senior officers are also responsible for ensuring the standards of officers and subordinates. It is also important for them to understand and to know the level of standards that need to be achieved by officers and subordinates.

The quality of young officers is more determined by the Officer Cadet School at the Defence Academy of RBAF, as an early education centre for officers.

His Majesty hopes that the centre will continue to produce disciplined and professional military officers, while at the same time is capable of nurturing aspects of spirituality and genuine loyalty, given the 10 years of the centre's establishment, during which it managed to train 2,216 officers, including 605 officer cadets.

"I am confident that the senior officers have so far been able to act wisely in implementing any plans, including the capacity to overcome all issues being faced by personnel of RBAF. These are among the challenges to be addressed in the best possible way," said His Majesty.

With regard to challenges, it includes the challenge of maintaining the usability of RBAF's assets, which cannot be taken lightly, the capacity and readiness of these assets must always be at a high level

Therefore, all levels in RBAF must really make sure that the usability of these assets is always at a high level of capacity and readiness.

His Majesty added, in the era of the Fourth Industrial Revolution, with the evolution of ever-growing advanced technology, the establishment of the Cyber Defence Unit at RBAF should also be realised, considering that RBAF will observe its 60th anniversary.

Additionally, it also serves as a buffer against cyber threats which can have serious implications for the level of operations and defence systems of Brunei Darussalam.

Therefore, RBPF needs to set high standards for its training policies for each type of training to be carried out. The methods used to determine these standards should be up-to-date and internationally recognised.

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"PGK must constantly be aware of people's high expectations for its personnel in carrying out their responsibilities towards the peace and security of this country," said His Majesty.

Following His Majesty's previous visit in October 2019, RBPF has obviously undertaken a number of initiatives and efforts to increase and bolster the fitness level of PGK personnel, through improving the training and requirements, particularly in terms of logistics and infrastructure, in addition to maintaining the overall image of the force. Nevertheless, there are still issues and problems that require appropriate attention and action.

On leadership, His Majesty said that all organisations need to have a competent leader, particularly when in charge of an elite

His Majesty added that discipline, the willing to look after the welfare of personnel and listening to the problems of subordinates are some of the most important qualities in leading an elite team. Selfish behaviour such as the arbitrary adjustment of existing polices, according to personal capacity, is inappropriate and also issuing orders and penalties which change according to whim and does not follow the proper Standard Operational Procedures (SOP).

An example of this is the fitness training set out for PGK personnel, where the complete 3 km run in special PGK gear has been replaced with a 1.6 km run with the personnel wearing only vests. This should not be allowed to happen as it can compromise the personnel's performance standards and physical strength.

"Therefore, in my view, RBPF should make plans for the immediate replacement of leadership at the PGK. The candidates must not only be mature, but also qualified and possess leadership qualities that are apposite to the awarding of the PGK Barrett and badge, not be chosen due to partisanship or cronvism. It is my hope that the PGK will have the right officers in the right posts," stressed His Majesty.

In ensuring safety during training, particular attention should be made to other operational assets such as vehicles, where vehicles are reportedly insufficient in number.

It is surprising that PGK only has a few operations units to the extent of borrowing vehicles from the Department of Criminal Intelligence.

"If this is true, then it will affect the effectiveness of PGK's operations in carrying out its roles and responsibilities. How can PGK perform according to expectations if it lacks vehicles that are functioning properly?" said His Majesty.

His Majesty would like these issues to be addressed in an

Any amelioration plans for PGK, such as human resources development, the acquisition of equipment and assets, as well as the maintenance of infrastructure should not be done only

"These issues should be noted and all developments reported back to me," said His Majesty.

"The relevant parties must give their cooperation in ensuring the effective functioning of plans so that PGK can perform its duties and responsibilities as an elite squad on par with its regional counterparts," added His Majesty.

Earlier, His Majesty was delighted to learn of the joint exercises between PGK and the Special Forces Regiment of the Royal Brunei Armed Forces (RBAF), which allows both sides to exchange views and knowledge, as well as to improve proficiency and to promote professionalism.

"I welcome PGK's plan for its involvement in joint training with elite squads on a regional and international level, as well as locally," said His Majesty.

During the unscheduled visit to the Special Operations Squad Complex, RBPF, His Majesty took a closer look at the squad's equipment and weaponry.

The Special Operations Squad, RBPF plays a role in safeguarding His Majesty and the royal family, and to combat terrorism, criminals and militants. During its early days since its establishment in 1974, the squad was previously known as the Police Special Section. In 1980, the squad was renamed as the Special Operations Squad.

Unscheduled visit to MoH: Overcome weaknesses accordingly

BANDAR SERI BEGAWAN. March 4 – The issue of medicine shortage and depleted stocks in hospitals and health centres, especially in the three districts beyond Brunei-Muara was highlighted by His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah ibni Al-Marhum Sultan Haji Omar 'Ali Saifuddien Sa'adul Khairi Waddien, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam in a titah (royal speech) during an unscheduled visit to the Ministry of Health (MoH).

Patients are sometimes forced to go to Raja Isteri Pengiran

Anak Saleha (RIPAS) Hospital to get their medicine which is burdensome, especially for the elderly.

In recent years, there have been persistent reports of changes in medicine brands, which raises the question, why, and were these changes made in order to get cheaper prices.

questioned whether MoH has ever based its selection process from visiting pharmaceutical companies, in order to ensure medicine quality and consumer safety.

His Majesty acknowledged that MoH is trying to provide proper health services, but there are still obvious weaknesses in certain areas, such as patients being made to wait for long periods to see a doctor, which inevitably results in resentment and annoyance.

"More serious still is that patients have to wait for hours in order to receive treatment at the Accident and Emergency Department, due to a continual lack of doctors. As a rule, there shouldn't be such a deficiency in this department, but it still happens. Why? Is the administration aware of this matter, and if so, what has been done or what action has been taken to address it? If any action has been taken, then why is it still ongoing?" said His Majesty.

His Majesty added that those in charge of the administration should conduct a first-hand investigation of the situation. It is not enough to just read or receive reports, particularly if there had never been any reports at all. The meaning of the Accident and Emergency Department is a place to receive treatment immediately.

However, these are not only weaknesses that concern the public interest, there are also weaknesses related to the management of the ministry's own staff, such as the service scheme, which has not been updated. This has led to many qualified officers within the ministry receiving a Higher National Diploma (HND) salary scale, which is believed to have originated from their Scheme Allied Health Professional (AHP) services not being renewed.

"Similarly, a number of paramedics are reportedly engaged in nurse's positions because the paperwork for the provision of paramedics has not been completed by the administration even though it has already took 10 years," said His Majesty.

In the titah, His Majesty said that there is also a tendency for government nurses to move to private hospitals. His Majesty questioned on why is this happening and urges MoH needs to conduct a study on it.

"Also worth examining are equipment and mechanisms, such as how many ambulances are required for each district and how many drivers are needed? There are also reports of paramedics occasionally taking over as ambulance drivers, despite the fact that these paramedics have not been given training on how to drive an ambulance. These are not trivial matters; they are crucial in ensuring efficiency and safety," added His Majesty.

His Majesty also said that MoH has launched its strategic plan in September 2019, with a focus on five objectives - excellence in healthcare services, the prevention and control of infectious diseases, public protection through effective policies and regulations, immunity through the use of optimum and innovative resources, and a transparent and proactive administration.

All of these objectives are impressive, but we have yet to see them being reached. The MoH was provided with a huge budget of almost \$400 million, and is expected to deliver excellent services for citizens and residents.

"The services are being supplied by four government hospitals. Given this, there is no reason why good and quality services cannot be provided but these are all determined by the quality of the management and administration - if both are good, then the results will be good," said His Majesty.

Being provided with a huge budget and sufficient equipment is just a standard process in achieving goals. The most essential component is human resources because here have been cases where the achievements were outstanding, despite a small budget allocation and modest equipment.

"Within MoH, there are various levels of officers and staff from

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the highest to the lower ranks. All of them are required to carry out their respective duties well and perfectly," said His Majesty.

In dealing with COVID-19, MoH can be seen as successful in managing the COVID-19 pandemic with the integrated cooperation of various parties. This is a remarkable fact which is worthy of our gratitude.

On the other hand, there are reports of MoH employees violating Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), such as one health centre instructing the cleaning staff to clean the equipment for storing swab samples such as glass tubes and refrigerators.

His Majesty stressed, in accordance with the SOPs, the cleaning process should have been performed by a nurse, instead of a cleaner who was not trained to conduct the procedures.

In a similar manner, there were violations in the delivery of swab samples, by failing to isolate the samples and even putting them in the same vehicle for conveying blood and urine test samples. In keeping with the SOPs, the delivery should have been made with a different vehicle.

"Such incidents indicate the deficiencies of the management and the administration, same goes to another ongoing issue which is the overdue or delayed Coronavirus allowances for some frontliners, such as ambulance drivers and nurses," said His

Apart from that, there has been some confusion regarding payment. Several nurses complained that they should have received five payments, but instead received only three.

During the unscheduled visit, His Majesty toured the departments and sections under the ministry, including the Medical Superintendent Community Health, Community Health Services, the Administration and Finance and Operational Unit, the Permanent and Deputy Permanent Secretaries' offices, the Minister of Health's office, Department of Scientific Services (DSS), the Toxicology Section, the Food Chemistry Section, the Environment Section, the Illicit Drugs Section, the Physical Evidence Section, and the Forensic Biology and DNA Section.

March 29 - The vision of the Department of Adat Istiadat Negara is clearly to provide the public with knowledge and understanding on adat istiadat or customs and traditions, while its mission is to perform customs and traditions ceremonies and inform the citizens and residents about customs and traditions as a cultural heritage.

However, these efforts for development will require a leader as the planner and source for ideas, in addition to being a driving force, but if the leader is weak and lacking in ideas, then how can the organisation function effectively.

His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah ibni Al-Marhum Sultan Haji Omar 'Ali Saifuddien Sa'adul Khairi Waddien, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam stated the matter in a titah (royal speech) at the Special Meeting of the Adat Istiadat Council.

In the titah, His Majesty the Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam said that the Department of Adat Istiadat Negara does not yet have a planner with brilliant ideas on how to empower the customs and traditions. Even upgrades, where necessary, are still not being implemented. It seems as though they are just waiting for instructions, without making any proactive plans.

This is in stark contrast to the role and responsibility of the Department of Adat Istiadat Negara in preserving conventions (adat resam) so that they remain acceptable, well-ordered and applied accordingly. They are also responsible for contemplating and planning schemes for overcoming any deficiency, weakness or fault, so that our customs could thrive, become enriched, further refined and remain unique.

His Majesty touched on the basic role of the Department of Adat Istiadat Negara and for the Adat Istiadat Council not be concerned with matters outside of their own duties and responsibilities. Such as pondering over the refurbishment of the Seri Begawan Religious Teachers University College (KUPU SB) whether it should be refurbished; there are other, more relevant parties to serve this purpose.

Similarly, the sprucing up of Bandar Seri Begawan with various projects is not the responsibility of the Department of Adat Istiadat Negara and the Adat Istiadat Council, when relevant parties are available for this.

"It is more important for the department and the council to fulfil their own duties and responsibilities, so that there will be no further occurrences of negligence or oversight," said His Majesty.

These need to be done in accordance with the customs and traditions guidelines or Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) - if there are any - with precision and immediacy, instead of being delayed.

For instance, the public had already learned of the news of the

passing of Al-Marhum His Royal Highness Prince Haji 'Abdul 'Azim ibni His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mui'zzaddin Waddaulah, in advance through other means due to the delayed official announcement, and the announcement was left entirely to Radio Television Brunei.

Similarly, the announcement on mourning attire caused a frantic rush among men to buy white cloth to line their songkok, while women searched for white headscarves. The funeral management was also found to be improper.

His Majesty also pointed out that during the funeral ceremony, there were various issues which should not have occurred, such as the use of cangkul for the royal tomb. In the past, a scooping basket (bakul pungkis) would be used, rather than taking the short route of simply digging the soil. This is where the customs need improving upon. If we do not want any improvements, then there is no need for us to have customs.

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His Majesty also commented on the functions and responsibilities the race, and a nation with customs and traditions has prestige. of the Department of Adat Istiadat Negara which is to provide assistance and advisory services to government agencies, non-governmental organisations, associations, and learning institutions on matters pertaining to customs and traditions.

His Majesty questioned if the Department of Adat Istiadat Negara is unable to carry out its work properly, then how can it advise and guide other parties on an appreciation of the customs and traditions? By virtue of this, the Department of Adat Istiadat Negara will need to undergo self-evaluation to rectify its administration.

Earlier, His Majesty said that Brunei Darussalam is standing firm because of religion and the customs and traditions, religion is upheld and the customs are valued. Both are interchangeable with our national identity.

Hence, His Majesty emphasises that like religion, customs also need to be preserved because it is the sweetness and beauty of

Therefore, we must never relinquish the customs.

Customs form the main pillar of the institution of the monarchy and the nation. It should be supported and strengthened, instead of being left to deteriorate and fall into decline.

Case 192 was announced on March 10; a 41 year old man who arrived in the country from India via Malaysia on the March 5.

Cases 193 to 199 were announced on March 14. All cases arrived in the country from Malaysia via Singapore on March 1.

Cases 200 to 202 were announced on March 16. All are from the Philippines who arrived in the country on March 3.

Case 203 was announced on March 17; a 43 year old man who arrived in the country from the Philippines on March 3.

Cases 204 and 205 were announced on March 20. Case 204 is a 34 year old man and case 205 is a 43 year old man, who both arrived in the country from Indonesia on March 7.

Case 206 was announced on March 21; a 46 year old man who arrived in the country from Jakarta on board Royal Brunei Airlines BI 736 on March 7.

Case 207 was announced on March 28; a 31 year old woman who arrived in the country from the United Kingdom on March 14.

Six hundred and fifty-nine people are currently undergoing mandatory self-isolation, while 15,708 have completed their mandatory self-isolation since March 2020.

In the meantime, 220 samples have been tested for the SARS CoV-Two Virus, bringing the total number of lab tests since January 2020, to 114.134 tests.

Due to global lockdown, ASEAN's information sector became not only a vital source of data, but it also became responsible in ensuring the information conveyed was correct and timely. This was stated by Yang Berhormat Dato Seri Setia Haji Awang Abdul Mokti bin Haji Mohd. Daud, Minister at the Prime Minister's Office, at the 15th Conference of the ASEAN Ministers Responsible for Information (15th AMRI) and Related Meetings held via video conference at the Prime Minister's Office.

In the Plenary Session of the 15th AMRI, the Minister at the Prime Minister's Office delivered a statement about the increased importance of the information sector due to the COVID-19 pandemic. To this end, the Minister was pleased that AMRI's actions on fake news and misinformation were in line with the Leaders' Declaration of the Special ASEAN Summit on Coronavirus Disease 2019 and the Joint Statement of the Special ASEAN Plus Three Summit on Coronavirus Disease 2019, which

Furthermore, the Joint Statement of the AMRI to Minimise the Negative Effects of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)

endorsed in 2020 demonstrates AMRI's commitment to strengthen cooperation in enhancing public communication, and supporting the free flow of information during and after COVID-19 in ASEAN. From a positive perspective, COVID-19 has accelerated the process of moving towards a more digitised way of living.

Even in lockdown, media technology has enabled us to sustain communication through digital means; improve our knowledge and use of digital technology; and develop digital commerce and trade. However, increased use of digital and social media has also given rise to the spread of fake news and misinformation; misuse of media technology; and cybercrime as well as cybersecurity attacks. In this regard, AMRI must not be complacent in countering the negative aspects of the "new normal".

The Minister made four suggestions, which are to strengthen coordination in urgently addressing fake news, specifically through the ASEAN Task Force on Fake News; to continue shaping a community that are responsible users of media; to engage with other sectors to counter cybercrime; and to ensure timely information on travel bans and restrictions. On this, Brunei Darussalam proposed for the information sector to work closely with other sectors and relevant national agencies in broadcasting travel updates and information.

Brunei Darussalam, as ASEAN Chair for 2021 has chosen the theme "We Care, We Prepare, We Prosper," which underscores ASEAN's collective pursuit to improve the well-being and livelihood of its people, especially as the region works to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic. The theme emphasises that ASEAN needs to work together to realise shared interests and confront challenges of common concern. All this will ultimately enable the people of ASEAN to thrive, prosper, and secure sustainable development, for the benefit of present and future generations.

The theme of the 15th AMRI "ASEAN: A Digital Community with Accessibility for All" is relevant to Brunei's chairmanship goals, and welcomed the Framework for Promoting Accessibility for All in ASEAN Digital Broadcasting endorsed by the AMRI in December 2020. Brunei Darussalam supports the initiative to increase access for all groups of people including those with disabilities and senior citizens, and has launched the first phase of sign language interpretation on 'Berita Perdana' national primetime news on February 1.

The Minister also highlighted an excerpt of His Majesty the Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam's *titah* (royal speech) at the 37th ASEAN Summit, in which His Majesty stated that the regional outlook and post-2025 Community Vision will be shaped by actions in the coming years. These must therefore be arranged well so future generations can face the next era with confidence and optimism.

The information sector is as important as the health and finance sectors in helping ASEAN recover from the COVID-19 pandemic and build a more prepared, dynamic and sustainable community. AMRI's support towards Brunei Darussalam's aim to promote Strategic and Holistic Initiative to Link ASEAN Responses to Emergencies and Disasters (ASEAN SHIELD) in 2021 is important. SHIELD is an overarching approach to better shield the society, economy and the broader developmental agenda, as well as to enable a swift and collective response in mitigating impacts of emergencies and disasters. This work in particular includes supporting the use of digital technologies to facilitate the digital transformation of the region, enhancing communication practices and cooperation during crisis situations. and strengthening media and information cooperation with other relevant sectorial bodies, stakeholders, and partners within and beyond the region.

The Conference began with an Opening Ceremony in which His Excellency Anucha Nakasai, Minister attached to the Prime Minister's Office of the Kingdom of Thailand as AMRI Chair for 2020 and 2021, in his opening remarks touched on the important role played by AMRI in maintaining ASEAN's effective role under the fields of media and information, especially in light of the unprecedented situations brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic. His Excellency stated that ASEAN is moving towards a digital community with accessibility to all, through the reinforcement of digital skills of ASEAN citizens and ensuring that no one is left behind.

His Excellency Dr Phan Tam, Vice Minister, Ministry of Information and Communications, Viet Nam was the Deputy Chair of the Conference. Also attending were Ministers and senior officers from other ASEAN member states as well as the Secretary-General of ASEAN.

The 15th AMRI also noted the report of the 18th Senior Officials Meeting Responsible for Information (18th SOMRI), the 6th SOMRI+3 and the 3rd SOMRI+Japan which included Brunei Darussalam's reports on ASEAN cooperation with the Republic of Korea (ROK) and the ASEAN Plus Three. Brunei Darussalam is currently the country-coordinator for ASEAN-ROK dialogue

In the afternoon, the Minister also attended the 6th AMRI+3 Meeting together with Ministers and Heads of Delegation from other ASEAN member states as well as the Plus Three Countries. The Meeting was chaired by Thailand.

The 27th ASEAN Economic Ministers Retreat officially commences

BANDAR SERI BEGAWAN, March 2 - The 27th ASEAN Economic Ministers Retreat officially commenced via video conferencing at the Sepakat Room of the International Convention Centre (ICC), Berakas.

The meeting was chaired by Yang Berhormat Dato Seri Setia Dr. Awang Haji Mohd. Amin Liew bin Abdullah, Minister at the Prime Minister's Office and Second Minister of Finance and Economy.

ASEAN Economic Ministers from ASEAN member states and Dato Paduka Lim Jock Hoi, ASEAN Secretary-General attended the virtual meeting. Representing Brunei Darussalam was Yang Mulia Dato Seri Paduka Dr. Haji Abdul Manaf bin Haji Metussin, Deputy Minister of Finance and Economy (Economy).

Taking into account that the spread of COVID-19 has not yet subsided, a fullfledged recovery in the region will require continued unfaltering cooperation in the ASEAN Economic Community (AEC) integration agenda, particularly to look into immediate-to-long term goals of efforts to revive the ASEAN economy.

The two-day retreat will endorse Brunei Darussalam's 10 Priority Economic Deliverables PEDs as ASEAN Chair for 2021 in-line with the theme 'We Care, We Prepare, We Prosper'.

Divided into three strategic thrusts, the PEDs will focus on recovery in the region through initiatives such as streamlining non-tariff measures and investment facilitation, providing a recovery plan for ASEAN tourism sector, and opening new markets and partnerships for ASEAN with the launch of the possible ASEAN-Canada FTA negotiations.

The second strategic thrust is digitalisation for a resilient ASEAN by focussing on the work in providing a safe, secure and harmonised e-commerce environment and digital ecosystem. This includes

initiatives such as the ASEAN Agreement on E-Commerce and a regional action plan in the area of cyberspace.

The third strategic thrust is sustainability efforts towards advancing an inclusive and sustainable economic growth through initiatives such as support and quidance for micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs), development of a regional framework for Circular Economy and cooperation in sustainable energy transitions.

The meeting will also discuss and provide guidance on the post COVID-19 recovery efforts in the region including initiatives implemented under ASEAN, Comprehensive Recovery Framework; progress under the ASEAN Economic Community including 2021 priorities of sectorial bodies under the purview of AEM and the Post 2025 Vision for the ASEAN Economic Community (AEC); ASEAN external economic relations including progress in ratifying the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) Agreement as well as status of the review on ASEAN-India Trade in Goods Agreement (AITIGA).

During the Consultation with ASEAN Business Advisory Council (ASEAN-BAC), the ASEAN-BAC, led by Yang Berhormat Siti Rozaimeriyanty binti Dato Seri Laila Jasa Haji Abdul Rahman, Legislative Council member as ASEAN-BAC Chair briefed the ministers on the priorities and initiatives for 2021.

Among the priorities for this year are: a legacy project called 'Harnessing Impact for Resilient Employability Digitally (HIRED)' and action lines that would contribute to the economic recovery in the region.

The 27th AEM Retreat was preceded by the Preparatory Senior Economic Officials Meeting (Prep-SEOM) on March 1.

The meeting was chaired by Dr. Hajah May Fa'ezah binti Haji Ahmad Ariffin, Permanent Secretary (Economy) at the Ministry of Finance and Economy; and was attended by all senior economic officials of ASEAN member states, officials from the ASEAN Secretariat and officers from the Trade Division at the Ministry of Finance and Economy.

EV Pilot Project: Driving Towards a Greener Nation

JERUDONG, March 25 - Based on the Brunei Darussalam National Climate Change Policy (BNCCP) that was launched on July 25, 2020, carbon emission from the land transport sector in 2018 was at 13.6 per cent, and was the third largest sector in terms of greenhouse gas (GHG) emission in the country.

The BNCCP has set 10 strategies to pave way towards the country's resilience in climate change and low carbon emission.

"Electric Vehicle (EV) is the third strategy, with the target of increasing EV shares to 60 per cent of the total vehicle sales in this country by 2035," said Yang Berhormat Dato Seri Setia Awang Abdul Mutalib bin Pehin Orang Kaya Seri Setia Dato Paduka Haji Mohammad Yusof, Minister of Transport and Infocommunication during the launching of the EV Pilot Project at BRIDEX Hall 2.

The Minister of Transport and Infocommunictions said that the EV Pilot Project will involve various stakeholders with the target of making evaluations and studies on the effectiveness of the EV, along with the public's response, after two years of implementation.

"The policies and programmes have been, and will continue to be reviewed and monitored by an action group which was established early last year, namely Electric Vehicle Joint Task Force (EVJTF) led by Ministry of Energy. Through the whole of nation approached with the involvement of government, nongovernment agencies and stakeholders, the objective of EVJTF, among others to discuss the short and long-term need for EV implementation, so that the country is better prepared before the widespread deployment of EV in the country," said the Minister.

The Minister explained that the annual average of new vehicle registration in Brunei Darussalam for the past five years was 12,658 vehicles per year.

"By 2035, according to an early study conducted by the EVJTF with the Brunei Darussalam Climate Change Secretariat, it is estimated that 11,400 new vehicles are expected to be registered, with 6,800 vehicles or 60 per cent are Electric Vehicles or EV," added the Minister.

Towards achieving the target, policy drafting and programmes to encourage EV ownership including incentives; infrastructure provision; customer protection; capacity development programmes including retraining and upskilling; emergency response; waste disposal and continuous dissemination are currently being

implemented and planned under the role of EVJTF, and these are carried out with industry players and other stakeholders.

With the consent of His Majesty the Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan of Brunei Darussalam, an initiative has been provided for the duration of the EV Pilot Project, where vehicle licences (VL) for any EV involved or otherwise in the project are exempt from payment until a later establishment of the VL rate for EV based on electric motor power. One of the main activities that will be implemented during the pilot project is to identify strategic locations where EV charging stations will be installed in phases according to the people's need.

The project was officially launched by Yang Berhormat Dato Seri Setia Awang Haji Ali bin Apong, Minister of Primary Resources and Tourism; Yang Berhormat Dato Seri Setia Ir. Awang Haji Suhaimi bin Haji Gafar, Minister of Development; Yang Berhormat Dato Seri Setia (Dr.) Awang Haji Mat Suny bin Haji Md. Hussien, Minister of Energy; Yang Berhormat Dato Seri Setia Awang Abdul Mutalib bin Pehin Orang Kaya Seri Setia Dato Paduka Haji Mohammad Yusof, Minister of Transport and Infocommunications; and Yang Mulia Dato Seri Paduka Awang Haji Matsatejo bin Sokiaw, Deputy Minister of Energy as Co-Chairmen of and members of the Brunei Darussalam National Council on Climate Change.

The meeting also looked forward to the establishment of the ASEAN Aid which is expected to imbue ASEAN citizens with a sense of regional agendas and greater awareness as well as expanding public's mindshare on ASEAN developments.

The meeting also noted that the Financial Rules for the ASEAN Disaster Management and Emergency Relief (ADMER) Fund will be revised to allow the public to contribute to the ADMER Fund.

The 25th ASCC meeting commended the other areas of focus, including Health and Development, Environment and Climate Change, Social Welfare, Education, Youth and Sports, Culture and Information, Rural Development and Poverty Eradication, Human Resources Development, as well as the follow-up to the Mid-Term Review (MTR) of the ASCC Blueprint 2025.

The meeting agreed to forge ahead to better organise regional efforts and guide ASEAN as it progresses with its community building efforts, in tandem with the ASEAN Political-Security Community Pillar and ASEAN Economic Community

meeting supported Brunei Darussalam's proposal to establish a Strategic and Holistic Initiative to Link ASEAN Responses to Emergencies and Disasters (ASEAN SHIELD) and welcomed the proposed establishment of a Roadmap and Terms of Reference for the High-Task Force (HLTF) for the ASEAN Community's Post 2025 Vision, as mandated by the Hanoi Declaration on the ASEAN Community's Post-2025

Brunei economy shows positive growth in 2020

BANDAR SERI BEGAWAN, March 18 - Brunei Darussalam's activities such as the manufacture of petroleum and chemical economy in 2020 grew by 1.2 per cent which was attributed to an increase in the Non-Oil & Gas sector by 9.0 per cent. Meanwhile, the Oil & Gas Sector recorded a decline of 4.9 per cent. The overall growth in 2020 was achieved after the gross domestic product (GDP) in the first nine months recorded a positive growth.

In the fourth quarter (Q4) 2020, Brunei Darussalam's GDP at current prices was valued at BND4.1 billion compared to BND4.8 billion in Q4 2019. The Oil & Gas Sector, comprising oil & gas mining and manufacture of Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG), which accounted for 44.8 per cent of the total gross value added (GVA). Meanwhile, the Non-Oil & Gas Sector, which includes downstream

products, contributed 55.2 per cent.

At constant prices, GDP recorded a negative growth of 1.4 per cent year-on-year in Q4 2020. This was due to a decrease in the Oil & Gas Sector by 8.6 per cent. Meanwhile, the Non-Oil & Gas Sector recorded an increase of 7.4 per cent.

The decline in the Oil & Gas Sector was mainly due to a decrease in the production of crude oil from 122.7 thousand barrels per day in Q4 2019 to 105.1 thousand barrels per day in



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
Q4 2020. Natural gas production also recorded a decrease from 34.5 million cubic metres per day in Q4 2019 to 32.5 million cubic metres per day in Q4 2020. In addition, LNG production declined from 982,117 MMBtu per day to 901,071 MMBtu per day during the same period of time.

Meanwhile, the growth in the Non-Oil & Gas Sector was mainly due to the downstream activities following the increase in the production of petroleum and chemical products, with a GVA of BND362.5 million at constant prices.

This was followed by an increase in the subsector of Wholesale and Retail Trade which contributed by an increase in the domestic demand as travel restrictions remain effective amid the COVID-19 pandemic. The increase in this subsector was also in line with the increase in retail sales driven mainly by the sales of Computer & Telecommunication Equipment. The Health Services subsector also increased in line with the increase in both government and private health services activities.

In addition, the Agriculture, Forestry & Fishery sector also recorded an increase of 27.5 per cent in Q4 2020. This was due to an increase in the production of subsectors such as Fishery, Livestock & Poultry and Vegetable, Fruits & Other Agriculture. An increase in Fisheries activities was mainly due to the production of farm prawns under aquaculture industry. In addition, an increase in livestock & poultry activities was mainly associated with an increase in the production of cattle and broiler. Meanwhile, paddy production was the biggest contributor to the increase in the Vegetables, Fruits & Other Agriculture subsector.

By expenditure approach, negative GDP growth was mainly due to a

decrease in the external demand (exports of goods and services) by 10.2 per cent. Domestic demand also recorded a decrease of 1.2 per cent due to decreases in the Government Final Consumption Expenditure by 5.4 per cent and Gross Capital Formation by 1.9 per cent particularly government investment. However, this growth was moderated by an increase in the Household Final Consumption Expenditure by 5.0 per cent.

Gross domestic product (GDP) is a measure of the total value of goods and services produced in a particular period after deducting the cost of goods and services used up in the process of production.

CPI increases 1.9 per cent

BANDAR SERI BEGAWAN, March 22 - The Consumer Price Index (CPI) in January 2021 increased by 1.9 per cent year-on-year compared to January 2020. Prices of Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages increased by 4.1 per cent. Meanwhile, Non-Food prices increased by 1.3 per cent.

The CPI increase was largely attributed to increases in the prices and costs of Transport (6.2 per cent); Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages (4.1 per cent); and Education (1.9 per cent). However, this was moderated by decreases in prices and costs of Clothing and Footwear (4.3 per cent); Furnishings, Household Equipment and Routine Household Maintenance (1.1 per cent); and Restaurants and Hotels (0.5 per cent). The increase in prices of Transport was largely attributed to rise in prices of motor vehicles.

Rising prices of Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages was driven by the hike in food prices such as vegetables; chicken; as well

as beef and buffalo meat. The increase in the price of vegetables was due to uncertain weather conditions. Meanwhile, the increase in the price of chicken, beef and buffalo meat was due to increased domestic demand following travel restrictions and limited import supply. Furthermore, the rising cost of Education is due to the increase in tuition fees of selected private educational institutions.

On a month-on-month basis, the CPI in January 2021 increased by 0.5 per cent compared to December 2020. The Food and Non-Alcoholic Beverages Index increased by 0.1 per cent while the Non-Food Index increased by 0.6 per cent.

The CPI is a measure of price changes of goods and services paid by the consumer in a specified period and compiled on a monthly basis. The list of goods and services in the CPI is based on the average expenditure per household from the Household Expenditure Survey (HES).

RPPI Q4 2020 decreases 4.9 per cent

BANDAR SERI BEGAWAN, March 29 - Autoriti Monetari Brunei Darussalam (AMBD) today published Brunei Darussalam's Residential Property Price Index (RPPI) for the fourth quarter of 2020 (Q4 2020). The index is compiled using data sourced from the banks in Brunei Darussalam, and is published with close cooperation from the Ministry of Development, in particular the Authority for Building Control and Construction Industry (ABCi).

In Q4 2020, the RPPI was at 90.6 showing the decrease of 4.9 per cent year-on-year compared to Q4 2019, and a decrease of 12% quarter-on-quarter compared to the previous quarter (Q3 2020).

Based on the mortgage data obtained from the banks, there were

131 transactions for private residential properties in Q4 2020, compared to 182 transactions in Q3 2020. The majority of these transactions were for detached house (53.4 per cent) followed by semi-detached houses (19.9 per cent); terrace house (18.3 per cent); apartments (3.8 per cent) and land (4.6 per cent).

The median purchase price for all types of private residential properties was \$254,000 in Q4 2020 – lower by 5.0 per cent compared in Q4 2019 and higher by 2.1 per cent compared to Q3 2020. The median prophase prices for specific types of properties were \$289,000 for detached houses; \$250,000 for semi-detached houses; \$202,500 for terrace houses; \$210,000 for apartments; and \$75,000 for land.
