Islamic propagation gets a boost

DAKWAH CENTRE OPENED

His Majesty Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddien Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam last month officially the Pusat Dakwah Islamiah in Bandar Seri Begawan.

The complex of striking whitetiled buildings sited some seven kilometres north of the national capital is set to become the nerve centre for Islamic missionary and propagation activities in Brunei Darussalam.

The work of the Pusat Dakwah Islamiah or Islamic Missionary Centre will also focus on research, education and the mounting of a permanent exhibition of Islamic artifacts from within and without the country.

Research at the centre will be concerned with the origins of Islam in Brunei Darussalam. Scholars will be invited from overseas to take part in studies being carried out here.

The educational aspects of its work will be directed at training imams of the many mosques throughout this Islamic sultanate, upgrading the standards of islamic religious instuctors in schools and teaching new converts to the faith.

Therefore in order to ensure continuing harmony there must be a total awareness and understanding of its importance. These values should be inculcated and disseminated among the people.

Amnesty granted to seven

His Majesty the Sultan dan Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam has granted amnesty to seven people who have been in detention for varying periods of up to ten years.

The seven persons released on August 27 1985 were Pengiran Anak Chuchu bin Pengiran Anak Mohd Salleh, Pengiran Haji Sani bin Pengiran Haji Mohd Daud, 48, Awang Nassar bin Mokti, 43, Awang Ismail bin Tengah, 30, Awang Ahad bin Haji Tuah, 33, Awang Abdul Ghani bin Angis, 43 dan Awang Sahari bin Abdullah 55.

Before their release they underwent a series of information seminars where they were updated on the latest developments on the social, economic and political situation in Brunei Darussalam.

The seven ex-detainees took ouths of allegiance to Allah, His Majesty the Sultan dan Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam and the country at a mosque set in the suburbs of Bandar Seri Begawan, on the August 24 1985.

New stamps mark entry to world bodies

The Brunei Darussalam post office has issued a set of four stamps each costing 50 cents to commemorate the country's entry to the United Nations, the Association of South East Asian Nations, the Commonwealth and the Organisation of Islamic Conference.

The set issued on September 23 1985 were also available as ministures costing \$2.

Overseas collectors who wish to acquire this set or other future philatelic issues should write to the Philatelic Bureau. Postmaster General, Brunei Darussolam to make a standing order. Requests for a standing order should be accompanied by a minimum deposit of \$30.

Pilgrims return from the haj

There were emotional scenes at Brunei International Airport when the record number of pilgrims on the Haj returned from Mecca early last month.

Crowds of friends and relatives were waiting to meet them.

This year 2677 pilgrims went on the Haj from Brunei Darussalam. Among them were 10 new converts to Islam who travelled on passages paid for by the Government. Seven hundred and twenty civil servants also went on government passages after completing 15 years of services with the Government.

The oldest pilgrim this year was 95-year-old Haji Pudin bin Lamit from Kampong Jerudong, While 14-month-old Dayang Suerayanti binte Jaya was the youngest

The pilgrimage to Mecca is superintended by the Religious Affairs Department Intending pilgrims this year paid about \$6,300 each to cover the cost of travel and accomodation. They also attended courses in Brunei Darussalam to prepare for various stages of the hoj.

Brunei Darussalam joins another world body

Brunei Darussalam has been admitted as a member of the Islamic, Scientific, Educational and Cultural Organisation (ISECO).

The Minister of Education and Health, Pehin Orang Kaya Laila Wijaya Dato Seri Setla Awang Haji Abdul Aziz who signed the ISECO statute in Islamabad on September 1 1985 led a delegation to the second general conference in the Pakistani capital.

The Director-General of ISECO Professor Habi Boutalib welcomed Brunei Darussalam's admission saying that it would further strengthen Islamic unity worldwide.

Technology meets culture at Tsukuba Expo

The Scupei Darussalam stand in the Tsukuha International Science Exposition received well over one million visitors

This is the first time that firmed Darussalam participated in an international expo of this scale

Speaking at the celebration of Brunei Dariasalam's national day at the expo. the chief guest Pehin Orang Kaya Setia Pahlawan Dato Seri Setia Awang Abdul Rahman bin Dato Setia Haji Mohd Taib, Minister of Development said, "It is our belief that this cardial relationship and association can be made more lasting and meaningful through the understanding and appreciation of each other's cultures and traditions."

The Minister said that Brunes Darussalam's "Technology in harmeny with Culture" exhibition showed how the country blended its strong cultural heritage with modernisation.

A 27-strong cultural troupe from the Ministry of Welfure, Youth and Sports performed traditional dances, songs and gave demonstrations of parcak stat, a makey form of self defence during the celebrations. About 2000 people watched the hour-long performance which was screened on the jumbotron kingsized television screen at the expo.

Japan mainly buys crude oil and gas from Brunei Darussalam

Six countries exempted from visa laws

Brunei Darussalam has an-nounced visa exemptions for British citizens and those of five other countries. A Foreign Ministry statement said that with effect from the first of last month nationals of Japan, France, Switzerland, Canada and the Republic of Korea will be able to enter Brunei Darussalam without visas for stays not exceeding 14 days. Visas will be needed if the visitor intends to stay longer or

take up employment.

For citizens of the United Kingdom visas will be needed if the visitor intends to stay longer than 30 days or take up employment. British overseas citizens and British dependent territories citizens are not covered by the British exemptions.

At present only ASEAN nationals are exempt from visa

he handicapped children's I playgroup at the Raja Isteri Pengiran Anak Saleha hospital held their annual slow bicycle race at the hospital grounds last month.

The race was in conjunction with a similar event held at the Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital in London.

The playgroup, which caters for children under five, is one of five run in various parts of the country. The groups meet at a local clinic or hospital and are led by trained personnel like speech and occupational therapists. The groups also have ready access to

paediatric advice if needed.

At the playgroups the children enjoy themselves with crayons, plasticine and other educational toys. At the same time the older ones are taught to be independant and to cope with daily needs like dressing or feeding themselves.

The groups also meet with the families of the children to advise and encourage them to cope with their handicapped children.

A local business house donated hats and T-shirts to mark the event while the band of the Royal Brunei Armed Forces was on hand to entertain the children.

It was a distinguished gathering that witnessed the official opening of the Islamic Dakwah Centre by His Majesty Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam on September 16 1985 which coincided with the first day of 1406 Hijrah.

Among those present at opening were His Majesty Maulana Paduka Seri Begawan Sultan General Sir Muda Omar Ali Saifuddien Saadul Khairi Waddien, Minister of Defence, His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Perdana Wazir Sahibul Himmah Wal Waqar Pengiran Muda Mohammed Bolkiah, Minister of Foreign Affairs, His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Bendahara Seri Maharaja Permaisuara Pengiran Muda Haji Sufri Bolkiah, His Royal Highness Paduka Seri Pengiran Di-Gadong Sahibul Mal Pengiran Muda Jefri Bolkiah, Minister of Culture, Youth and Sports cum Deputy Minister of Finance, other cabinet ministers, diplomats, community leaders

and senior government officials.

In his speech His Majesty said that it was the government's intention to entrench the position of Islam as the official religion of the country and to co-operate with other islamic nations.

Earlier the royal motorcade arrived to the beating of drums by a hadrah band.

Later His Majesty declared open and toured a permanent exhibition of Islamic artifacts obtained from within and outside the country.

The centre, as it stands, represents phase one of the project. It has a fully equipped conference hall with a seating capacity for up to 400 persons. The plush carpeted conference hall has full audio-video facilities including booths for interpreters. Facilities for banking, a post office and international telephone and telex links are also part of the conference secretariat.

Phase two of the project will see the rise of an administration block and accomodation for those attending courses or conferences at the centre



Bruneians best at calligraphy

Local entries have swept top honours in an Islamic calligraphy competition organised in conjuction with the opening of the Islamic Dakwah Centre in Bandar Seri Begawan.

The competition, open to muslims living in ASEAN countries, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philipines, Singapore, Thailand and Brunei Darussalam, was organised by the government and judged by an international panel that included experts from Indonesia and Malaysia.

Entries from Brunei Darussalam swept first places in two categories and in one class took the top five prizes. An entry from Indonesia, Sudianto Aly won the first prize in the third categoriy.

The best overall winner was Awang Haji Metussin bin Haji Ahmad of Brunei Darussalam.

The top three winners in each of the categories flew to Brunei Darussalam last month to receive their prizes.

ANCIENT QURAN PRESENTED

A leading banking corporation in Brunei Darussalam recently presented a 300-year-old copy of the Quran to the Islamic Dakwah Centre near Bandar Seri Begawan.

The gift which was purchased in London was believed to have originated in Persia and been written in the early 1700's.

Several pages of the Quran are written in gold leaf.

The bank's manager, Mr. Jeremy Davies presented the gift to the acting State Religious Affairs Officer, Yang Dimuliakan Pehin Straja Khatib Dato Paduka Seri Setia Ustar Awang Haji Yahya bin Haji Ibrahim.

Agricultural sector to be given to priority

The government is considering the possibility of making agriculture an important sector of the economy.

Pehin Orang Kaya Setia Pahlawan Dato Seri Setia Awang Abdul Rahman bin Dato Setia Haji Mohammed Taib, the Minister of Development said this at the 10th anniversary celebrations of the Sinaut Agriculture Training Centre. He said that the government was keen to see the agriculture industry take-off and had offered many incentives for farmers including loans and subsidy schemes.

The minister also said that there was a need for more farmers to take up agriculture on a commercial scale. Despite the various difficulties posed by terrain and soil conditions the technology to make it work were available in the country.

"Changing the existing system of part-time farming into commercial scale activity would obviously require trained Bruneians" he added.

In conjuction with the anniversary celebrations of the SATC's existence as a teaching institution there were exhibitions of fruit, vegetable and handicraft. There were also displays by leading local commercial houses supplying equipment, materials and services to the agriculture industry.

British Council opening here

The British Council will open an office in Brunei Darussalam next month. A statement from the British High Commission here said that the council would mainly be involved in educational, cultural and technical co-operation.

Its contribution to education development is expected to include assistance to the newly set up University of Brunei Darussalam.

A first for the British Council here is that about 55 percent of its running costs would be sponsored by Shell International, the Hongkong Shanghai Banking Corporation and the Centre for British teachers.

BUILDING INDUSTRY GOES METRIC

The Government Public Works Department in the Ministry of Development is spearheading a move towards metrication in the construction industry.

Early last month the department put on a 'Think metric' exhibition to familiarise its own corps of engineers, architects and other staff with the new system. Another special target of the exhibition was the many contractors and consultants who do work for the government.

Other departments under the Ministry of development include the Department of Electrical Services, the Town and Country Planning, the Land and Survey departments.

The metrication programme provides for a one year transition during which all technical drawings will carry dual notations -metric and imperial.

The Public Works Department has also produced a handbook that gives quick conversions from the imperial and local units to the metric units and vice versa.

Plans are also in hand to hold several seminars with contractors and consultants to help ensure that the transition is made without major problems or adverse effect on current work schedules.

BRUNEI HOSTS BORNEO GAMES

The premier event on the Borneo athletics calender, the Borneo Games was resurrected last month after a lapse of 16 years.

The annual Borneo Games used to be held between contingents from Sarawak, Sabah and Brunei Darussalam. On September 6 and 7 1985 about 200 athletes from the three territories ran, jumped and threw of their best at the Hassanal Bolkiah National Stadium in Bandar Seri Begawan in a total of 32 events.

This year hosts, Brunei Darussalam shone in the men's distance events collecting golds in the 1500 metres through Talib Haji Tahir and his brother Taha who strided to the front in the 3000

metres steeple chase.

Sabah, the overall champion contingent bagged 19 gold medals, 8 silver and 14 bronze while, Sarawak took 11 golds, 18 silver and 7 bronze and Brunei Darussalam 2 golds, 6 silver and 11 bronze.

The 1986 Borneo Games will be held in Kuching, Sarawak.



Water taxi pick-up point

Much of the capital city, Bandar Seri Begawan is built on the Brunei river some 27 kilometer from the sea.

The houses of the famous Kampung Ayer (swater village), in reality a loose cluster of several score villages, neatly huddled on one bank are separated by a wide watery aisle of river from the urban hustle and bustle on the other side.

Flowing through the heart of the city is a tributary of the Brunei river, the Sungal (=river) Kianggeb.

At high tide the water level in the Kianggar allows the busy river traffic of mainly water taxe to drop off their passengers right in the heart of the city. Within 500 metres of this landing can be found many government offices banks, the markets and shops.

It is also the favourite fanding point for fishermen to unload the day's catch. Some fishing boats come from fishing towns as far away as 30 kilometres. Other boats bring in fruit and fowl in season from the hinterland.

The boats used as water taxis or for fishing are almost always wooden hulls four to seven metres long and up to two metres wide powered by outboard engines. The boats are manufactured as a cottage industry within Kampung Ayer with an average six-metre hull costing about \$2000.
