




A ll of Brunei Darussalam took a holiday to celebrate the country's national day which fell on February 23, 1988. Offices closed, shop shutters rolled down and work stopped so that everybody could take part in the programme to mark the fourth anniversary of the resumption independence.

The celebrations were centred in the capital Bandar Seri Begawan.

His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam was at the stadium to see his subjects and other residents of the Sultanate display patriotic fervour in marchpasts, dances and song in a show that involved 30,000 participants.

Regional stability through understanding

Brunei Darussalam's entry into the world community of nations has necessitated some doubling up in the area of international relations.

Support to the Sultanate from loyal and non-interfering friends grows apparent each year she celebrates national day. The rate at which she has been receiving foreign diplomatic visits, especially in the last year, is aeons ahead of the days when Brunei Darussalam was just another territory tucked away on the island of Borneo.

His Majesty the Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam has spoken recently of the responsibility that the Sultanate has in preserving regional political stability jointly with geographical neighbours.

The ASEAN youth programme proposed by Brunei Darussalam at the Manila Summit last December is part of the effort to promote regional understanding and loyalty to the cause of peace. Getting young minds acquainted should contribute towards the preservation of the existing stability.

His Majesty said that friends outside ASEAN were also sought and Brunei Darussalam would extend a hand of friendship to anyone irrespective of colour. In recent times several African nations have made diplomatic calls on Bandar Seri Begawan.

In forging these ties the principle of non-interference in the domestic affairs of other countries, sincerity and mutual respect must remain the framework.

H is Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam last month received credentials from Switzerland's non-resident Ambassador to the country, His Excellency Mr Kurt Wyss.

The 49-year-old envoy who is based in Singapore presented his appointment papers at Nurul Iman Palace in Bandar Seri Begawan on February 4, 1988. Mr Wyss joined the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs in 1972 and has served in Jakarta, Mexico and Amman.

General L. Benny Moerdani, Commander of Indonesian Armed Forces was granted an audience by His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam on February 17, 1988.

General Moerdani, on a two-day visit to the Sultanate, also met on Pengiran Sanggamara Diraja Major General Pengiran Haji Ibnu the Deputy Defence Minister and Pehin Orang Kaya Seri Dewa Major General Dato Seri Pahlawan Haji Mohamed Chief of Staff, Royal Brunei Armed Forces.

His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam granted an amnesty to four people who have been detained at Jerudong Detention Centre, outside Bandar Seri Begawan, for varying periods.

Those released on February 23, were Abdul Hamid bin Munap, 46, who has been in detention since 1962, Mudin bin Nadin 55, Salleh bin Mahal, 55 and Yassin bin Badar 70 have been in detention for 20 months.

Before their release they underwent a five-day orientation programme to bring them up-to-date on the social, political and economic developments in the country.

They took their oaths of allegiance to His Majesty the Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam on February 22, 1988.

All four were also granted an audience by His Majesty at Nurul Iman Palace.

French "Alpha Jet" aircraft on show



The Defence Ministry had an opportunity to view a French-German built trainer-cum-combat aircraft (foreground) in Brunei Darussalam last month. The two Alpha jets and three other aircraft of the French Air Forces were on display to the Sultanate's armed forces personnel for two days. At the preview on February 2, 1988 were Pengiran Sanggamara Diraja Major General Pengiran Haji Ibnu, the Deputy Defence Minister and Pehin Orang Kaya Seri Dewa Major General Dato Seri Pahlawan Haji Mohamed, the Royal Brunei Armed Forces Chief of Staff. The Alpha Jet is a tandem two-seater, twin-engine, capable of basic and advanced training as well as tactical support missions. Publicity material on the two flying machines describe them as possessing "excellent flying characteristics and demonstrativity of stall, spin and transonic flight."

F ull text of the national day address by His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam. The text published is a translation from the Malay language in which it was originally delivered.

I n the name of Allah the Compassionate and the Merciful.

May the blessings of Allah be with you.

With God's blessings the rakyat and the people of Brunei Darussalam have been able to enjoy peace, prosperity and development since independence.

On this historic occassion, I would like to record my appreciation and thanks to the whole nation, including members of the security forces, who have since independence supported my government in ensuring the security, prosperity and development of the nation.

I feel, through the support and cooperation given, the pride of the people in our independence and sovereignty. I hope this spirit will continue to enable the country to develop further and to establish political and social stability, Godwilling.

But while enjoying this peace, there are groups trying to threaten social and political stability by manipulating the minds of the people through copied political propaganda that they themselves do not understand. These groups, calling themselves political leaders, are in fact business people who blamed the government for their failures. They also failed in their studies abroad including in the United Kingdom.

Their ability to lead the people is questionable since they are unable to look after their own affairs.

My government will not hesitate to take stern action on such groups. I would like to remind my people to be always on guard against people who make empty promises.

My government will continue to give priority to the development and welfare of the people through various projects and diversifying the country's economy. These include education, health and communications. My government has updated and reorganised the education system to ensure the availability of skilled manpower for the country's economy. In line with my government's policy to

develop skilled manpower special attention will be given to health both physical and mental. Realising the importance of communications in national development and trade with the outside world, various modernisation projects on the country's communications system have been and will be done. At the same time, my government welcomes foreign investors to set up industrial joint ventures with locals.

Efforts to update the government administrative machinery, include the import of foreign experts to teach modern administrative theories to officials of my government to help set up an efficient, effective and honest system of administration. In this connection, as I have said before, it is essential for government officials to cooperate with one another and jointly bear the responsibility of improving the administration.

On the international scene, Brunei Darussalam continues to give great attention to the need to establish political stability in the region. The stability can be achieved if there is understanding among its peoples. Brunei Darussalam, as I spoke at the Third ASEAN Heads of Government meeting in Manila recently, is ready to operate ASEAN youth programmes. This is only to contribute to the process of establishing understanding and solidarity in ASEAN. Because with these factors efforts at political and economic cooperation within ASEAN can be speeded up.

In line with the country's foreign policy Brunei Darussalam has expanded its friendly relations to several countries in Africa. This shows that Brunei Darussalam bases relationships only on the basis of equality, sincerity, mutual respect and freedom from interference in each others internal affairs and not on criteria such as colour.

On this national day celebration, I would like to remind the people, especially youth, on the need to brace themselves for international economic and political challenges. This can be

done if we are aware of the need to protect our independence and sovereignty and faith in our religion. Towards achieving this, it is important to be always disciplined and cultured in our daily life. Such a nation can help the government to maintain law and order in society. It will also help development and defend the country from any threats. At the same time, a disciplined and cultured people should be independent and strive to improve their life. The public should be prepared to contribute without expecting reward and they must take pride in their work.

As citizens, it is important to maintain our cultural heritage, have mutual respect, be dignified and pious. These qualities are symbols of our nationhood. I hope these cultural values will be imbued in our younger generation. Only with a strong nation can its people enjoy peace without social ills. This is in line with the theme of the national day celebrations this year: "Berdisiplin, Cergas, Berbudaya, Negara Bahagia".

To create the disciplined, energetic and cultured nation I desire, my government, apart from providing basic requirements, will also provide sports and recreational facilities in all districts in the country, to meet the needs of the public.

Finally, I once again, would like to thank all people, including government servants and members of the Royal Brunei Armed Forces and the Royal Brunei Police Force, who have worked with my government with dedication, honesty and sincerity in their duties and responsibilities and also in maintaining and defending national security. I would also like to congratulate and thank members of this year's celebrations committee and those involved in contributing to the success of the celebrations. Let us all pray to Allah that Brunei Darussalam and all within it will always be under His protection and enjoy continuing prosperity.

May Allah give us guidance, peace, favours and His blessings be with us all.

Bruneians celebrate patriotism

Prunei Darussalam is prepared to establish relations with other nations on the basis of mutual trust and respect and noninterference in each other's domestic affairs.

Addressing the nation on the eve of Brunei Darussalam's fourth anniversary of National Day on February 22, 1988, His Majesty the Sultan and Yang Di-Pertuan Negara Brunei Darussalam said that the Sultanate had forged friendly ties with several African states.

Earlier the Bruneian monarch said his government had always welcomed foreign investors to form joint ventures with local industrialists.

His Majesty the Sultan also spoke of Brunei Darussalam's concern for the importance of maintaining regional stability.


Errant politicians came under fire from His Majesty for their attempts at sowing discord among Bruneians and blaming the government for their personal failures.

The celebrations were held in Bandar Seri Begawan on February 23, 1988. His Majesty the Sultan took the salute at a march past of some 16,000 of his subjects including the armed forces, uniformed bodies, civil servants, social and trade associations.

The show included gala displays of patriotic songs, martial arts demonstrations as well as cultural dances performed by school children.





Judge calls for more Bruneian legal brains

M ore Bruneians have been urged to study law so as to meet the Sultanate's legal and judicial needs from its own resources.

Speaking at the formal opening of the legal year on February 8, 1988 in Bandar Seri Begawan, Dato Seri Paduka Sir Denys Robert, the Brunei Darussalam Chief Justice said that of those on the roll of advocates and solicitors only 15 were Bruneians, a number he described as 'insufficient to meet the country's needs.'

Dato Seri Paduka Sir Denys Robert hoped that more Bruneians would take advantage of government scholarships and other educational schemes to qualify at law.

Touching on the legal profession in the country, the Chief Justice added that although machinery has existed for the investigation of complaints against advocates and solicitors, it had not been necessary to resort to them which was 'a tribute to the good sense and desirable practices among lawyers in the Sultanate.'

Dato Seri Paduka Sir Denys Robert who retires as Chief Justice of Hongkong this month will continue serving as Chief Justice of Brunei Darussalam.

The post of the President of the Court of Appeal in Brunei Darus-

salam will be filled by the new Chief Justice of Hongkong who will visit the country to conduct the Court of Appeal accompanied by selected judges of the Supreme Court of Hongkong.

Pengiran Laila Kanun Diraja Pengiran Bahrin bin Pengiran Haji Abbas, the Attorney General who also spoke at the function said that beginning this year, offences carrying the death penalty would no longer be tried by a judge sitting with the aid of asssesors but would be tried by two judges of the High Court.

Also this year under a new provision of the Legal Profession Act, foreign legal practitioners who apply for annual practising cer-

tificates in the country would be required to apply for work permits if they have no right of residence so as to encourage a more permanent bar to serve the public.

The other changes included a recognition of the Malaysian Certificate of Legal Practice issued under the Malaysian Legal Profession Act which is an alternative qualification for admission to the local bar.

Mr Y Y Chin, a long standing member of the local bar, speaking on behalf of his brother lawyers welcomed the introduction of part of the Legal Profession Act describing it as 'a step forward in the right direction in harmony with national aspiration.'

The Minister was speaking at the official opening of the Brunei History Centre's new premises in Bandar Seri Begawan on February 25, 1988.

The Brunei History Centre was set up in 1982 to research and compile details of Brunei Darussalam's royal genealogy, the biographies of dignitaries, and the archiving of manuscripts for reference.

Brunei Malay in a minute

Pungent leaves for culture and coughs

resh green betel leaves of the *Piperraceae* family (scientific name) known locally as 'sirih' have a sharp pungent taste. Smeared with a daub or two of prepared lime and folded round a little fine-cut tobacco and a few slices of areca-nut, they make the betel-quid for a good chew.

The perennial evergreen pepper vine cultivated in many bruneian backyards for its aromatic leaves are widely used among Malays as a masticatory, and offered to guests much like a hospitable cup of tea.

The betel-quid is often used a medicine for fever, gonorrhoea and diarrhoea. The warmed leaves are applied to the chest to relieve coughs and asthma, and to the breast used to arrest lactation.

In the Malay traditional engagement ceremony designated betel-leaves called 'sirih junjung' are carried at the head of a prospective bridegroom's party.
